Vice Chair Jim Porter called the meeting of the Kansas State Board of Education to order at 10:00 a. m. Tuesday, August 13th, 2024, in the boardroom of the Landon State Office Building, 900 SW Jackson St., Topeka, Kansas.

Kansas State Board mission statement, Kansans Can Vision statement, moment of silence, Pledge of Allegiance

Vice Chair Porter read both the board's mission statement and Kansans Can Vision statement. He asked for a moment of silence after which all recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

Approval of the Agenda

Vice Chair Porter asked for a motion to approve the meeting agenda for both Tuesday and Wednesday. Mrs. Dombrosky requested the removal of items d, e, and f from the consent agenda to vote on separately (as one group). Mrs. Hopkins asked for a report on e. Board attorney Ferguson asked to remove item b completely as it is not ready to vote on.

Mrs. Arnold moved to approve the agenda for Tuesday and Wednesday with Consent Agenda item b taken off by board attorney Ferguson until October, d and f taken off by Mrs. Dombrosky to vote on separately, and Mrs. Hopkins would like to take e off for discussion and then vote. Dr. Horst seconded the motion. Motion carried 9-1. McNiece voted no.

Approval of the July 9 & 10, 2024 minutes

Vice Chair Porter asked for a motion to approve the minutes of July 9 & 10, 2024.

Mrs. Hopkins moved to accept the minutes of July 9 & 10, 2024 as written. Mr. McNiece seconded the motion. Motion carried 9-0-1. Mr. Hershberger abstained because he was not present at the meeting.

Commissioner's Report: Rose Capacities and Back to School

Dr. Watson celebrated Kansas students coming back to school. He expressed gratitude to the teachers, support staff and administrators. The work of the board, and he noted of himself, is to serve the students and families of Kansas, and then very closely aligned with that, to serve the educators, administrators and staff that work in local schools. Most positions statewide have been filled, even in the Western areas, although some of those are long term substitutes. Overall, this is a very good trend.

Dr. Watson focused on Article 6, Section 2 of the Kansas Constitution. The state board oversees the general supervision of public schools. The legislature shall make suitable provision for finance. The tension between the two institutions is established in the constitution. The friction is between the board which oversees and establishes standards and regulations and the legislature provides the means to fund K-12 public education. He discussed the history of the Rose Capacities, and how they became constitutional and put into statute. The Rose Capacities are expectations above and beyond basic skills:

- Sufficient oral and written communication skills to enable students to function in a complex and rapidly changing civilization;
- Sufficient knowledge of economic, social, and political systems to enable the student to make informed choices;
- Sufficient understanding of governmental processes to enable the student to understand the issues that affect his or her community, state, and nation;
- Sufficient self-knowledge and knowledge of his or her mental and physical wellness;
- Sufficient grounding in the arts to enable each student to appreciate his or her cultural and historical heritage;
- Sufficient training or preparation for advanced training in either academic or vocational fields to enable each child to choose and pursue life work intelligently; and

 Sufficient levels of academic or vocational skills to enable public school students to compete favorably with their counterparts in surrounding states, in academics or in the job market."

Dr. Watson shared the "2024 Back to School Video" produced by the KSDE communication department. Despite the low budget, the video was highly creative and full of humor, and the board enjoyed watching the young children who acted as tough news reporters.

Citizen's Forum

Vice Chair Porter opened the Citizen's Forum at 10:34.

Kirsten Workman, resident of Lansing, school board member, shared the experience of her local board evaluating the middle school Second Step program. Although her school board approved the curriculum, she personally feels the program may not be evidence based. She is here today to ask the State Board to look at the criteria for at-risk funding. The other programs of Second Step for other age group did have better evidence, but not the middle school program. She supplied the board with research documents about the program.

Vice Chair Porter closed the forum.

Introduction: Blue Ribbon Task Force on Screentime in Schools
Dr. Steel, Director, Office of the Commissioner
Gabrielle Hull, Public Service Executive, Division of Fiscal Services & Administrative Services
Payton Lynn, Division of Learning Services

Dr. Steel gave the overview of how KSDE staff established the task force. The first step was to reach out to the state board and request they choose three sub-areas to focus on. The chosen areas are:

- 1. Personal Devices in School
- 2. District owned devices and parent oversight
- 3. Screen time and mental health

In addition, each board member was asked to nominate three persons (from which two were selected by the KSDE staff) from their district to serve on the task force.

Gabrielle Hull explained there will be two days for each sub-area. The task force meets weekly starting at the end of August and going through mid-November.

Payton Lynn stated there are thirty six members on the task force: two state board members, two legislators, five students, five superintendents, five parents, five teachers, five principals, five local school board members, two IT staff (one school based and the other business based). Twenty of the members were recommended by the state board, and the remaining twelve were chosen based on location and category.

Dr. Steel shared that those who were not able to be on the task force, both those who were recommended by the board and those who volunteered, will be given a survey so they can express their thoughts and experiences. Dr. Watson clarified this task force will be online only, but livestreamed, archived, and available for all to watch on Thursdays at 4:00 – 5:30 (YouTube KSDE).

Parent Perception Survey Kristin Brighton, Founder of HirePaths

Mrs. Brighton shared the development and history of this parent perception survey. In 2019 she partnered with KSDE to conduct a benchmark survey of K-12 parents living across Kansas. Approximately 19,000 parents took that first survey which provided excellent benchmark data. Covid then appeared, so there was a pause, and then in 2020 she began the work again, working with industry and the campaign was launched in 2021. ESSER fund grants helped and yearly the parents were contacted with the survey. In 2024 there were less responses; 5,000 parents took the survey.

Since 2019, Kansas parents have:

- Become happier with options for students to pursue career and technical skills in high school.
- Developed a more positive perception of apprenticeships and technical colleges.
- Developed a more positive perception of skilled trade careers (such as construction workers, electricians, and welders).
- Become less convinced that their children must attend college to be successful.
- Become more concerned about the growing cost of higher education and student loan debt.
- Developed a more negative perception of some careers, many of which were affected by the pandemic (including nurses, teachers, and police officers).

Overall, parents are more supportive of technical education and alternative non-college paths to employment. Career Technical Education (CTE) during high school has become

Parent Survey 01:05:00 more accepted. Parents are concerned about college costs. A consistent perception is that children can stay in Kansas and be successful.

Mrs. Bone, the organizer of the KSDE annual conference, with the theme "Lighting the Path Forward," noted that the conference has been active for 30+ years. It is a professional development conference for teachers and administrators. It will be held in Wichita on October 23-25. It is designed on the four fundamentals (KESA), Safe and Supportive Schools, Technology and Cyber Security, and System Structures. All teachers, curriculum directors, building administrators, ELL professionals, special education teachers and superintendents are invited. As well, the board members are warmly welcome, as is IT staff and assessment staff. Chris Perry, Kansas educator and researcher, will be the keynote speaker.

Mrs. Ure introduced the other sponsors and the students. Panther Robotics competes through a robotics program called FIRST. FIRST is an acronym meaning For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology. FIRST offers programs for students in pre-K to 12th grade. We compete in the FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) which is the "varsity" level competition for high school students with teams from around the world. Each year in January, a new game is announced, and teams spend the next two months designing, building, and programming a 125 pound robot that will be able to complete tasks to play the game such as picking up game pieces and shooting balls through high or low goals.

The team present today is FIRST Robotics Competition Team 1108, Panther Robotics, located in Paola, Kansas. This year, the team qualified for World Championships in Houston, Texas by winning the Colorado Regional as well as winning the Impact award at the Greater Kansas City Regional for the impact the team has on our community, this is the highest award in FIRST. At the World Championships this year, the students played matches with students from five different countries. Through the FIRST program we have over one hundred alumni that have gone on to STEM careers such as physicians,

engineers, nurses, architects, graphic designers, and teachers. The alumni report that the technical, business, and leadership skills they learned through FIRST robotics enabled them to become successful leaders in their community and across the country. In the past three years, 100% of the students graduated high school and are pursuing higher education in a STEM field, of those 60% are pursuing an engineering career.

Members of the team also mentor elementary school students competing in the FIRST LEGO League Explore program at our local elementary school. This program serves as an introduction to robotics and programming to elementary school students.

Mrs. Ure shared that she is an elementary art teacher and who got involved with FIRST programs nine years ago when her daughter joined the Robotics team as a freshman in high school. Her daughter went from a shy girl who sat in the back and barely spoke to a confident, engaged leader of the team. Mrs. Ure started an elementary FIRST Lego League team, and now mentors four Lego League teams as well as the high school Robotics team.

The students spoke with maturity and compassion, explaining that these competitions were not just for winning, but for encouraging and supporting all the participants to learn. They gave a lively demonstration using "Bolts and Roses" to throw things around, spin and race off at high speed across the room and into the adjoining lobby. A wonderful time was had by all.

Education Funding Task Force 02:54:27 Dr. Harwood explained that in 2017 the legislature adopted the Kansas school equity and enhancement act, in response to the Kansas Supreme Court's Gannon decision. The legislature included an end date to the act of July 1, 2027. Therefore, there will be a task force created by the Kansas State Legislature that will recommend a school finance formula. This formula will encompass all the needs of equitable, adequate, consistent, and reliable school funding. It will be calculated to have all students meet or exceed the Rose Capacities. The task force will consist of eleven voting members appointed by November 30, 2024. To include three representatives, three senators, one member of the State Board, one parent of a K-12 student, one current or retired teacher and two superintendents (rural and urban). The representative from the State Board (must be a member) and the two superintendents are appointed by the State Board. This must be done no later than the November board meeting.

Act on recommendations of the Evaluation Review Committee for higher education accreditation and program approvals

Dr. Chmidling explained the steps that the Evaluation Review Committee (ERC) goes through to assess accreditation and program approvals. She went through the accreditation recommendations for Baker University and Friends University, as well as the program approvals for the five other higher education institutions.

Mrs. Arnold moved that the Kansas State Board of Education accept the recommendations of the Evaluation Review Committee for educator preparation accreditations for Baker University and Friends University, and program approvals for Bethel College, MidAmerica Nazarene University, Pittsburg State University, Tabor College, and Washburn University. Mr. Hershberger seconded the motion. Motion carried 10-0.

Dr. Catherine Chmidling, Teacher Licensure

Dr. Chmidling went through the upcoming accreditation and program approvals to be acted on by the board. She explained the accreditation standards and the procedure for asking institutions to improve their programs. Central Christian College is recommended for a Probationary Accreditation through 2026. She carefully explained all the steps being asked of the college prior to the ERC fall visit in 2026. Newman University had recommendations for several programs. This will be an action item in September.

Mrs. Arnold shared that the policy committee was asked to change the evaluation so that it was easier to use digitally, and Mrs. Fritz showed how the evaluation could be used on a cell phone or computer.

Kansas State Board of Education Wednesday, August 14, 2024

Vice Chair Porter called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. All members were present.

All in for Kansas Kids, early childhood strategic plan update Amanda Peterson, Director, Early Childhood

Mrs. Petersen shared an update on the All in for Kansas Kids, noting the two takeaways are 1) this is a collaborative project and 2) the document they are working on is available for the board to look through at a later date.

Mrs. Peterson stated that early childhood lays the foundation for student success. Since 2018, the Kansas State Department of Education has worked together with the Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, the Kansas Department for Children and Families, and many other early childhood partners to comprehensively assess and address statewide early childhood needs. Thousands of Kansans from across the state and in every county informed the first comprehensive needs assessment of early care and education programs and services, which led to adoption of the statewide *All In For Kansas Kids* strategic plan in 2020.

The Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund applied for and received subsequent federal Preschool Development Birth through Five grants to implement the strategic plan, and to update it. The Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund board will consider adoption of the updated *All In For Kansas Kids* strategic plan for early childhood on August 2, 2024. The draft 2024 *All In For Kansas Kids* strategic plan is organized into three pillars: Ecosystem, Workforce and Work Environments, and Experiences of Children and Families.

She noted the first five years of a child's life are an incredible opportunity to set a course for later success. That is why Kansas needs a strategic plan for early childhood. The plan includes a range of service and resources to support young children and their families, including childcare, health care, family supports, crisis services, home visiting, prenatal & maternal support, mental/behavioral health, Pre-K to twelve education and early intervention/developmental disabilities. Mrs. Peterson emphasized that collaboration between many agencies, support systems and communities is key.

In sharing the history of KSDE's work in this area, she went over the past decade as planning, grants, needs assessments, and strategic plans were developed. This work has

improved collaboration across the Kansas early childhood ecosystem, increased workforce supports and improved navigation for families.

The 2024 strategic plan is available on the Children's Cabinet website.

Mr. McNiece noted that this type of report for early childhood education would not have happened when he first joined the board. He spoke about his history with early childhood, and he thanked Mrs. Peterson for a fine report, well balanced between support and vision.

Receive item on higher education program standards for world languages educator preparation

Dr. Catherine Chmidling, Teacher Licensure, KSDE Keri Haberer, USD 260, Derby

Luanne Barron, Superintendent of the Kansas School for the Deaf

Dr. Chmidling gave an overview of the Educator Preparation Providers (EPPs) utilize program standards to:

- Develop their preparation programs and submit for approval.
- Monitor and redesign programs to ensure teacher candidates have access to learning opportunities that are aligned with the needs of today's learners and expectations of teachers.

She explained there are two types of program standards:

- Professional Education Standards: address teacher knowledge and skills for any classroom.
- Content Program Standards: standards for each area of content.

Mrs. Haberer, world language department chair in USD 260 in Derby, spoke about how the committee revised the standards to include American Sign Language and explained the areas which the standards address.

- 1. Standards 1-8
 - a. Language Proficiency: Interpersonal, Interpretive, and Presentational
 - b. Cultures, Linguistics, Literatures, and Interdisciplinary Concepts
 - c. Language Acquisition Theories and Instructional Methods for Second Language Learning
 - d. Planning and Instruction
 - e. Assessment of Learning
 - f. Learner Development and Diverse Needs
 - g. Creating a Supportive Learning Environment
 - h. Professional Development, Advocacy, and Ethics

Superintendent Barron thanked the board for the inclusion of American Sign Language

World Languages 00:35:06 (ASL) in the category of world languages. She noted there are many students presently taking ASL. The standards align ASL with the other language standards and she feels the standards for ASL are comprehensive and inclusive. For example, native speakers is a term used for oral languages, but we have added native signers to be inclusive of those who grew up learning ASL. ASL is not a written language, but we call it signed published, a video based publishing. There is a glossary of these definitions that include the unique aspects of ASL. There are many common elements between ASL and other world languages, such as a structured linguistic system with its own grammar, vocabulary, and the ability to facilitate expressive and receptive communication and a deep connection to cultural identity. ASL is remarkably similar to other world languages.

Dr. Petra Horn-Marsh, KU, covered statistics on ASL classes, which have grown 400%, so the interest and demand have been huge. In high school there are ASL classes being offered nationally. These ASL teachers need to have standards and training. There are three levels of proficiency, 1/2/3. At KU they offer levels 5/6. Many students walk into higher ed classes without the needed proficiency to succeed and must receive remediation first. We need higher standards in high schools so that when students come to us, they are ready to be trained into the profession.

Dr. Chmidling listed the several hundred names of volunteers in her PowerPoint to show appreciation for their hard work with this process.

Presentation on curriculum procedure on the local school district level and agency support for choosing high quality instructional materials

Dr. Ben Proctor, Deputy Commissioner, Direct Learning Services

Dr. Proctor introduced the subject of how curriculum is chosen and as a real life example, he invited two excellent teachers and curriculum coordinators from USD 501 in Topeka to lead the board through the process of adopting high quality materials.

Diane Kimsey is the elementary school math curriculum coordinator and Cheryl De La Cruz is the high school math coordinator for the Topeka district.

In working towards choosing a curriculum, they begin with parameters and guidelines, then form a selection committee (a teacher from each grade level, special ed and other teaching areas). The selection committee spends time in professional learning, they look at their values, standards, and investigate resources about how to select the best curriculum for their needs. This is followed by researching the resource options, and working together to share initial reviews, feedback from others on the committee, and finally

sharing top selections.

The publishers also have a chance to present the curriculum to the committee, and then there is time to go through all the resources and create the final selection and offer it to the local school board. If it is approved, the staff training, implementation and monitoring begin. Training continues as school begins, incorporating professional trainers from the publishers and through professional development workshops.

There were comments from the board noting smaller districts do not have the resources that a larger district like Topeka 501 has. Dr. Proctor shared that KSDE has specific tools and resources to help districts choose the best curriculum for that system. There is not one curriculum that is right for every system. Each system has the opportunity to collaborate with KSDE staff to effectively support the teachers in their work with students. Staff can also bring together similar school systems that are using the same types of curriculums. The systems can come together and discuss with other similar districts how the curriculum is working and what needs to be improved.

In closing, Dr. Proctor stated that KSDE is committed to providing statewide leadership that informs and supports the decisions made locally related to curriculum and instructional materials, including:

- Developing Kansas-specific guidance, tools and resources related to the selection and implementation of High Quality Instructional Materials (HQIM)
- Developing Kansas-specific HQIM implementation rubric and phrasing framework,
- Developing a Kansas Quality Observational Tool that reflects content-specific visions for quality, standards-aligned instruction.

Last month, Dr. Scott presented five systems that were conditionally accredited and now are being redetermined for accreditation status.

The ARC has recommended that the five systems be classified as accredited. Ulysses, LeRoy-Gridley, Burrton, Kinsley-Offerle, and Liberal have all made improvements and the committee feels confident in recommending a fully accreditation status.

In reference to this motion, Mrs. Dombrosky read a written statement explaining her vote: Sub HB2466 was overwhelmingly passed by the legislature in 2022. It is the basis for item e on the August consent agenda. Via the bill, the legislature requires all secondary schools to offer (or have a plan to eventually offer) a computer science course. Also, the legislature will make appropriations for teacher development grants to be awarded by the SBOE. Again, the legislature continues to expand technology in the schools. As well, the legislature continues to find ways to force its education agendas upon schools in the state.

Another note regarding Sub HB2466. The bill included a provision to diminish parent rights. The legislature chose to exempt "national assessment providers" to administer a "college and career readiness assessment questionnaire or survey" WITHOUT parent permission. It did this by excluding "national assessment providers" from the definition of "operator" in the state statues for SOPPA (Student Online Personal Protection Act). If you want to understand a little about what this "exemption" means, look at the definition of "personally identifiable information" in KSA 72-6332, and what an "operator" may and may not do as provided in KSA 72-6333.

D. McKinney-Vento Education funding for homeless children

Mrs. Arnold moved that the Kansas State Board of Education approve item d. which has been removed from the consent agenda. Mr. McNiece seconded the motion. Motion carried 9-1 with Mrs. Dombrosky voting no.

Item Title: Student Showcase: Akshay Nair, Blue Valley USD 229; Elise Davis, De Soto USD 232

Akshay Nair, a senior at Blue Valley West High School, Blue Valley Unified School District 229, and Elise Davis, a senior at Mill Valley High School, De Soto USD 232, were selected by Gov. Laura Kelly to attend the prestigious National Youth Science Camp, or NYSCamp, June 29-July 20.

The camp, which has been held in West Virginia's Monongahela National Forest since 1963, hosts many of the most academically accomplished high school seniors and college freshmen in the country. Only two students from each state and the District of Columbia are chosen by their respective governor from applications that include essays and a letter of recommendation.

While the National Youth Science Camp, or NYSCamp, does host notable industry leaders, and campers engage in a variety of high-level STEM activities, the camp purposely injects spontaneity in its three-week curriculum. "NYSCamp delegates are encouraged to live in the moment rather than constantly focusing on what comes next," according to the NYSCamp website.

Nair said he hopes to eventually work on a manned NASA mission to the moon or Mars. He plans to major in aerospace engineering and minor in astrophysics. He doesn't know yet which college he will attend but MIT, Stanford and California Tech are top of his list at the moment.

Davis also is undecided on a college at this time but said she is looking at several good engineering schools with civil engineering an interest at this time. Both Davis and Nair said the lecturers at NYSCamp opened their eyes to several of the STEM fields they might not have previously considered.

The State Board will have the opportunity to hear from these two students about their experience attending this esteemed science camp and how this has shaped their future plans.

In addition, the Board attorney is expected to advise the board on issues related to statutory and regulatory interpretation, open meetings, open records, and parliamentary procedure.

Other areas of knowledge and experience:

- Familiarity with the Kansas Administrative Procedures Act, the Kansas Open Records Act; and the Kansas Open Meetings Act;
- Familiarity with the Kansas constitution, statutes, and administrative regulations pertaining to the board in particular and education in general;
- Experience with civil litigation, including experience at the appellate level;
- Familiarity with federal education statutes and regulations such as IDEA, FERPA, ESEA, ESSA, National School Lunch Act; McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act.

Act on the recommendations of the Professional Practices Commission (revocation and denial)

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education revoke or deny the following licenses as described in the proposed orders for 24-PPC-7, 24-PPC-8, 24-PPC-9, 24-PPC-11 through 15, and 24-PPC-20.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

In each of the following cases filed with the Professional Practices Commission, KSDE mailed Complaints to the last known address of the Applicant/Licensees. In some instances, failures to deliver certified mail came back with updated addresses. When an updated address was provided, the Complaints were mailed a second time. No requests for hearings or answers were filed. If no answer is filed within the prescribed time of 15 days, the person shall be deemed to have admitted the allegations contained in the complaint and to have acquiesced in the proposed action, and the Complaint shall proceed directly to the State Board for default findings per K.A.R. 91-22-9(a). Proposed Final Orders are attached.

24-PPC-07

The Applicant is on felony diversion until December 22, 2025. Applicant is ineligible to be licensed while on diversion.

24-PPC-08

In 2023 the Licensee was convicted of two felony sex offenses (Sexual Exploitation of a Child).

24-PPC-09

In 2023 the Applicant was convicted of felony DUI. Applicant is ineligible to be licensed until 2028.

24-PPC-11

In 2023 the Licensee was convicted of a felony sex offense (Sexual Exploitation of a Child).

24-PPC-12

In 2016, the Applicant's California teaching credential was revoked, and is ineligible to be licensed in Kansas until they become eligible to be relicensed in California.

24-PPC-13

In 2023 the Licensee entered into a diversion after having been charged with battery. The victim of Licensee's battery was a minor child at the school where the battery took place.

24-PPC-14

In 2023 the Licensee entered into a diversion after having been charged with a felony (Interference with a Law Enforcement Officer).

24-PPC-15

In 2023 the Licensee was convicted of two felonies (Aggravated Assault). Licensee is now required by law to register as a sex offender, and was ordered to surrender his license as a condition of his probation.

24-PPC-20

In 2024, the Licensee was convicted of Furnishing Alcohol to a Minor and Contributing to a Child's Misconduct or Deprivation.

FINAL ORDER

NOW, on this 13th day of August 2024, the above-captioned matter comes for consideration by the Kansas State Board of Education (Board). Appearing for the Board are Chairwoman, Melanie Haas, and members, Betty Arnold, Dennis Hershberger, Michelle Dombrosky, Cathy Hopkins, Deena Horst, Jim McNiece, Ann Mah, Jim Porter and Danny Zeck. R. Scott Gordon appears on behalf of the Kansas State Department of Education. ("Applicant") does not appear.

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. On December 3, 2023, Applicant, applied for an emergency substitute teaching license. Applicant held an emergency substitute teaching license from 2013 through 2020.
- 2. On or about June 6, 2023, Applicant was charged in Johnson County District Court of one count of Giving a Worthless check in the sum of at least \$1,000.00 but less than \$25,000.00, a Level 9 felony. The crime is alleged to have taken place between January 2022 and October 2022.
- 3. On or about December 22, 2023, Applicant entered into a diversion agreement after having been charged with a felony defined in K.S.A. 21-5821(b)(2) in case. The term of Applicant's diversion is 24 months. Within the diversion agreement, Applicant stipulated to the charges and facts as they are contained in the charging affidavit as well as any police and lab reports.
- 4. KSDE filed a Complaint seeking denial of Applicant's application on June 28, 2024. The Complaint was mailed to Applicant's last known address by standard and by certified mail. The certified mail receipt indicates it was an insufficient address. On July 26, 2024, the Complaint was mailed to a new address. USPS tracking shows that it has been delivered.
- 5. The Complaint informed Licensee of the duty to file an Answer within 15 days. Licensee did not submit either a Request for Hearing or an Answer. Licensee is hereby deemed to admit the allegations contained in the Complaint and has acquiesced to the action proposed by KSDE, pursuant to K.A.R. 91-22-9(a).

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- The Kansas State Board of Education (State Board) is responsible for the general supervision of Kansas education, including the certification and licensure of teachers. Kan. Const., Art. VI and K.S.A. 72-255.
- 2. One of the obvious goals of education is to "instill respect for the law." <u>Hainline v. Bond</u>, 250 Kan. 217 (1992). An educator is a role model. <u>Hainline</u> at 224.
- 3. Teaching and school administration are professions with all the similar rights, responsibilities and privileges accorded other legally recognized professions. K.S.A. 72-2308.
- 4. The Kansas State Board of Education may deny the license of any teacher for misconduct or other just cause including entering into a diversion agreement after having been charged with any felony described in article 54 of chapter 21 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated. K.A.R. 91-22-1a.
- 5. Applicant's conduct is inconsistent with the commonly-held perceptions and expectations of a member of the teaching profession. Such conduct violates the public trust and confidence placed in members of the profession. Applicant's conduct demonstrates a lack of fitness to perform the duties and responsibilities of a member of the teaching and school administration professions and is sufficient and just cause to deny a license.

Item Title:

Act on revised Educator Preparation Provider standards for World Languages

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education approve the new educator preparation program standards for World Languages PreK-12.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

Educator Preparation Program Standards establish program approval requirements to ensure that preparation programs in Kansas provide educator candidates with the opportunity to learn the knowledge and skills educators need for today's learning context. The Educator Preparation Providers (EPPs) utilize program standards to develop their preparation programs and submit them for approval, and for continuous monitoring and improvement of their programs. The standards also help to establish professional learning requirements for licensure renewal.

Standards revision work groups are revising preparation program standards to ensure they reflect new knowledge and skills educators need for effectiveness in today's world. As work groups complete drafts, the draft standards are sent to appropriate Specialty Professional Associations (SPAs) when relevant and available, for alignment review, and are posted to receive public comments via the KSDE website. Each standards work group reviews any input from the SPAs and public comment and a final draft is formulated. Following review and final approval by the Professional Standards Board, the standards are sent for State Board of Education approval. Once approved, the EPPs have access to develop new programs around the standards and to revise their current programs to align to the updated standards.

Attached are the revised standards for World Languages PreK-12 and a crosswalk showing changes from the 2017 World Languages preparation standards. Staff and representatives from the standards revision committee will explain the process, present the standards and answer questions. These revisions were submitted as a Receive item in August 2024.

Kansas Educator Preparation Program Standards for World Languages Grades PreK-12

"Learners" are defined as children including those with disabilities or exceptionalities, who are gifted, and students who represent diversity based on ethnicity, race, socioeconomic status, gender, language, religion, and geographic origin.

Standard 1: Language Proficiency: Interpersonal, Interpretive, and Presentational Candidates in world language teacher preparation programs possess proficiency in the target languages they will teach. They possess receptive and productive skills in the target language at a minimum proficiency level that equates to Advanced-Low on the ACTFL rating scale or 3+ on the ASLPI rating scale.

Function 1: Converse in the interpersonal mode of communication at the minimum levels described above.

Content Knowledge

- 1.1.1 CK Candidates are aware of the levels of proficiency of the interpersonal mode of communication.
- 1.1.2 CK Candidates understand the importance of maintaining and advancing skills by creating opportunities for self and learners to have direct and virtual contact with native speakers/signers of the target language.

Professional Skills

- 1.1.3 PS Candidates initiate, sustain, and bring to closure a wide variety of communicative tasks, including those that require an increased ability to convey meaning with diverse language strategies due to complications or unforeseen events.
- 1.1.4 PS Candidates engage in a variety of formal and informal conversations on practical, social, professional, and abstract topics, using native-like discourse strategies in the target language.

Function 2: Interpret printed texts, speech, sign, fingerreading, and video by demonstrating literal, figurative, and symbolic comprehension.

Content Knowledge

1.2.1 CK Candidates understand the importance of maintaining and advancing skills by creating opportunities for self and learners to encounter authentic nonfiction texts, web content, videos, and literature.

Professional Skills

- 1.2.2 PS Candidates as listeners understand short conventional narration and description with a clear underlying structure, though comprehension may be uneven. The listener understands the main facts, distinctive viewpoints, and some supporting details.
- 1.2.3 PS Candidates understand conventional narrative and descriptive texts with a clear underlying structure though comprehension may be uneven. Candidates

understand fully and with ease short, non-complex texts that convey basic information and deal with personal and social topics.

Function 3: Present oral, written*, signed, and/or published-signed information to audiences.

Content Knowledge

1.3.1 CK In speaking or signing, candidates demonstrate control of vocabulary, grammatical structures, signed-production/pronunciation, and fingerspelling/spelling.

Professional Skills

1.3.2 PS Candidates express their own ideas on practical, social, and professional topics in formal and informal registers in the target language. Candidates deliver presentations without reading notes verbatim. Presentations consist of familiar literary and cultural topics and those of personal interest. They speak or sign in connected discourse using a variety of time frames and vocabulary appropriate to the topic. They use extralinguistic support as needed to facilitate audience comprehension.

Standard 2: Cultures, Linguistics, Literatures, and Interdisciplinary Concepts
Candidates select and make accessible authentic and relevant products, practices, and
perspectives from the target culture appropriate to the developmental needs and interests of
learners.

Function 1: Demonstrate understanding of cultures relevant to the target language and facilitate comparison of cultures through the products, practices, and perspectives of those cultures.

Content Knowledge

- 2.1.1 CK Candidates understand cultural realities as dynamic and complex.
- 2.1.2 CK Candidates understand the need to expand their knowledge base of language, art, religion, politics, daily living and customs, social sciences (e.g. history, geography, economics), literature, and the origins of the target language.
- 2.1.3 CK Candidates understand the value of first-hand experiences in the target culture.

Professional Skills

- 2.1.4 PS Candidates develop authentic situations for exploring culture to increase pragmatic, semantic, sociological, and aesthetic understandings.
- 2.1.5 PS Candidates engage learners in acquiring, updating, and re-evaluating their knowledge of the target culture.

Function 2: Demonstrate an understanding of linguistics, the dynamic nature of language, and language systems.

Content Knowledge

2.2.1 CK Candidates understand language as dynamic and complex.

Professional Skills

2.2.2 PS Candidates present language and culture in contextually meaningful situations.

2.2.3 PS Candidates facilitate comparison and contrast of learners' knowledge of language with the target language.

Function 3: Use the national and state standards and current technology to select, adapt, and integrate authentic sources on cultural themes as well as interdisciplinary topics.

Content Knowledge

2.3.1 CK Candidates are aware of developmentally appropriate authentic sources for texts.

Professional Skills

2.3.2 PS Candidates scaffold learners' study of authentic sources, providing vocabulary or contextual support for comprehension.

Standard 3: Language Acquisition Theories and Instructional Methods for Second Language Learning

Candidates demonstrate an understanding of the principles of language acquisition at different stages of learner development and use this knowledge to create linguistically and developmentally appropriate learning experiences.

Function 1: Demonstrate an understanding of the theories of second language acquisition.

Content Knowledge

- 3.1.1 CK Candidates understand how articulated language acquisition models (e.g. FLES, FLEX, immersion) lead to different language outcomes.
- 3.1.2 CK Candidates understand that the language acquisition process is long-range and sequential.

Professional Skill

- 3.1.3 PS Candidates select and employ a language acquisition model appropriate to the learners and the learning context.
- 3.1.4 PS Candidates explain language learning theories and strategies to learners to assist them in becoming better language learners.

Function 2: Apply appropriate and effective instructional methods.

Content Knowledge

- 3.2.1 CK Candidates know a variety of evidence-based instructional methods for teaching language.
- 3.2.2 CK Candidates understand the role that comprehensible input plays in the language acquisition process.

Professional Skills

- 3.2.3 PS Candidates employ appropriate instructional methods to improve learners' specific linguistic skills.
- 3.2.4 PS Candidates provide meaningful target language input (ACTFL goal is 90%) and scaffold instruction to assist learners in understanding this input.
- 3.2.5 PS Candidates present specific information on gestures and rhythmic properties and how to negotiate meaning.
- 3.2.6 PS Candidates immerse learners in target language speaking or signing through

informative, directive, expressive, imaginative, and other interactive means.

Standard 4: Planning and Instruction

Candidates plan, sequence, and apply a variety of appropriate instructional strategies to develop learners' knowledge and skills towards meeting the Kansas World Language Standards.

Function 1: Demonstrate understanding of the Kansas World Language Standards and sequence learning experiences appropriately.

Content Knowledge

- 4.1.1 CK Candidates know content standards and how they are organized in the curriculum.
- 4.1.2 CK Candidates know how content standards relate to other disciplines relevant to their learners' interests and levels.
- 4.1.3 CK Candidates know how content builds and relates through short-term and long-term learning experiences.

Professional Skills

- 4.1.4 PS Candidates explicitly communicate objectives to learners and involve learners in identifying pathways to goal achievement.
- 4.1.5 PS Candidates integrate cross-disciplinary skills that engage learners in meaningful application of content knowledge.
- 4.1.6 PS Candidates systematically plan lessons and units with short term and long term goals.

Function 2: Integrate the goals of the state standards in the design of engaging instructional practices and classroom experiences.

Content Knowledge

- 4.2.1 CK Candidates understand interpersonal, interpretive, and presentational modes.
- 4.2.2 CK Candidates know how to evaluate a range of evidence-based instructional strategies, resources, and technological tools for quality, accuracy, and effectiveness.
- 4.2.3 CK Candidates understand the cognitive processes associated with various kinds of learning (e.g. critical and creative thinking, problem framing and solving, invention, memorization and recall) and how these processes can be stimulated.

Professional Skills

Standard 5: Assessment of Learning

Candidates design formative and summative assessments using authentic sources, real-world tasks, and a variety of modes to evaluate learning. Candidates reflect on results of assessments to adjust instruction and communicate results to learners for goal setting.

Function 1: Design and use ongoing authentic performance assessment using a variety of assessment models appropriate for all learners.

Content Knowledge

- 5.1.1 CK Candidates understand informal and formal, formative and summative assessments.
- 5.1.2 CK Candidates know how to design assessments that clearly evaluate critical knowledge or skills and performance levels.

Professional Skills

Function 1: Monitor progress and adjust instruction to address learner strengths and weaknesses.

- 6.1.2 CK Candidates know how to identify diverse learners' language levels, language backgrounds, learning styles, exceptionalities, and interests.



Act on recommendations of the Evaluation Review Committee for higher education accreditation and program approvals

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education accept the recommendations of the Evaluation Review Committee for educator preparation accreditation for Central Christian College and program approvals for Newman University.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

The Evaluation Review Committee is submitting the following recommendations to the State Board regarding educator preparation accreditation for Central Christian College, and program approvals for Newman University.

The educator preparation accreditation and program review processes are guided by Kansas regulations 91-1-70a, 91-1-230, 91-1-231, 91-1-232, 91-1-234, 91-1-235, and 91-1-236, authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution. The current regulations were first adopted in 1997 and 2004, have been revised and updated regularly as-needed.

The accreditation review process relies on peer review by trained education practitioners from P12 and higher ed, who review the preparation provider for alignment to the provider accreditation standards which have been adopted by the State Board of Education. The alignment review includes examination of programs of study; alignment explanations, assessment instruments; collected data, analyses, and interpretations; policies and procedures for recruiting, admission, retention, and program completion; partnerships with P12 schools; stakeholder input and cocreation of preparation design including clinical experiences; feedback from preparation completers and employers; data-driven changes and their results; and the provider's quality assurance system.

The educator preparation program review processes are guided by Kansas regulations 91-1-235, and 91-1-236, authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution. The current regulations were first adopted in 1997 and 2004, have been revised and updated regularly as-needed.

The program review process relies on peer review by trained education practitioners from P12 and higher ed, who review the preparation provider's specific license/endorsement preparation program for alignment to the license/endorsement preparation standards which have been adopted by the State Board of Education. The alignment review includes examination of programs of study; alignment explanations, assessment instruments; collected data, analyses, and interpretations.

Following the institutional application and receipt of complete program reports, review teams of trained evaluators were appointed to review the educator preparation programs for the above institutions based on adopted State Board policies, procedures and regulations. These are available for review by any member or members of the State Board.

Each review team's report and each institution's response to the report, along with the institutional reports, were submitted to the Evaluation Review Committee (ERC) of the Teaching and School Administration Professional Standards Advisory Board. The Evaluation Review Committee consists of P12 educators, P12 administrators, and higher ed administrators, and forms a second peer review oversight committee, which reviews each educator preparation provider's license and endorsement preparation programs' alignment to the appropriate preparation standards.

The ERC, in accordance with procedures adopted by the State Board, prepared written initial recommendations regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to each education preparation program.

Each initial recommendation was submitted to the educator preparation institution and the institution was given 30 days to request a hearing to appeal the initial recommendation. For each of the providers, the ERC offered the opportunity for a hearing and prepared a written final recommendation regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the educator preparation provider or program. These final recommendations have been submitted to appropriate representatives of the educator preparation institutions and are now submitted to the State Board, as attached, for consideration and approval of the ERC recommendations for program status.

A copy of the regulations covering this process is also attached. Staff will be on hand to answer any questions. These recommendations were submitted in August 2024 as a Receive item.

Introductory Statement:

On June 20, 2024, the Evaluation Review Committee reviewed the application and hearing evidence for educator preparation provider accreditation for Central Christian College.

Documents that were received and considered include the Institutional Self-Study Report, Visitation Team Formative Feedback Report, Institutional Addendum, Visitation Team Final Report, EPP Rejoinder, Lead's Response, and institution's post-visit evidence.

ACCREDITATION RECOMMENDATION

Recommend "Probationary Accreditation" status through <u>December 31, 2026</u>, with a focused visit.

Area for Improvement (AFI): A statement written by a site visit review team or the Evaluation Review Committee that identifies a weakness in the evidence for a component or a standard. A single AFI is usually not of sufficient severity that it leads to an unmet standard. Areas for improvement should be remediated by the end of the accreditation term and progress toward improvement is reported annually in the annual report.

Standard 2

AFI 2.1: The EPP has provided evidence that partners co-construct mutually beneficial P-12 school and community arrangements for clinical preparation however additional documentation needs to be provided to show consistent proof of candidates' preparation. (R2.1)

Rationale AFI 2.1: Initial evidence of ongoing collaboration with educational partners is provided demonstrating co-construction of clinical placement experiences and shared responsibility for continuous improvement of the candidate preparation process. Documented progress is needed with consistent and ongoing evidence of implementation which include timelines, agendas, meeting minutes, data, and other artifacts.

AFI 2.2: The EPP provided limited evidence that it works with partners to co-select and evaluate high-quality clinical educators who demonstrate a positive impact on candidates and diverse P-12 student learning and development. (R2.2)

Rationale AFI 2.2: Limited evidence is provided regarding "co-selection" of "high-quality" clinical educators, however insufficient evidence is offered on the demonstration of "positive impact on candidates" as evaluations are only provided for a single semester and limited evidence is offered regarding "positive impact on diverse P-12 learners." Evaluation and co-selection still need to be addressed. Evaluation of and feedback to the cooperating teachers needs to be addressed.

AFI 2.3: The EPP has developed a plan to design and implement clinical experiences with sufficient depth, breadth, diversity, coherence, and duration to ensure candidates demonstrate developing effectiveness and positive impact. The EPP provided insufficient evidence, analysis, and interpretation of data to support claims that clinical experiences are successfully developing candidates' skills and positively impacting P-12 learning and development. (component R2.3)

Rationale AFI 2.3: The ERC recognizes collaboration with partners concerning a plan for a more robust clinical experience. Documented progress is needed with ongoing evidence of implementation which include timelines, agendas, meeting minutes, and data and other artifacts.

Standard 4

AFI 4.2: The EPP has demonstrated limited evidence that employers are satisfied with the completers' preparation for their assigned responsibilities in working with diverse P-12 students and their families. (R4.2)

Rationale AFI 4.2: The EPP provided limited data (one year), with limited contextual reference points (undefined response rates). Documented progress is needed with consistent and ongoing evidence of implementation which include timelines, data and analysis.

AFI 4.3: The EPP has demonstrated limited evidence that completers perceive their preparation as relevant to the responsibilities they encounter on the job, and that their preparation was effective. (R4.3)

Rationale AFI 4.3: The EPP provided limited data (one year out of the last three most recent cycles) with limited contextual reference points (undefined response rates). Documented progress is needed with consistent and ongoing evidence of implementation which include timelines, data and analysis.

Standard 5

AFI 5.1: The EPP has established a quality assurance system but it has yet to be consistently implemented. (R5.1)

Rationale AFI 5.1: Documented progress is needed with ongoing evidence of implementation which include timelines, agendas, meeting minutes and other artifacts.

AFI 5.2: The EPP does not clearly show that key assessments are valid and the data from them are reliable. (R5.2)

Rationale AFI 5.2: The EPP has not established validity and reliability for all EPP created assessments and will need to continue the validation process for all assessments and provide evidence of significant progress.

AFI 5.3: The EPP provides inconsistent evidence of stakeholder involvement in program design and evaluation. (R5.3)

Rationale AFI 5.3: Additional agendas and minutes were presented during the ERC hearing, however documented progress is needed with consistent and ongoing evidence of implementation which include timelines, agendas, meeting minutes, data, and other artifacts.

Stipulation: A statement written by a site visit review team or the Evaluation Review Committee identifying a deficiency related to one or more components or a standard. A stipulation is of sufficient severity that a standard could be determined to be unmet. For educator preparation providers (EPPs) seeking to continue their accreditation, an unmet standard must be corrected within two years to retain accreditation.

Standard 4

Stipulation 4.1: The EPP does not demonstrate the effectiveness of its completers' instruction of P-12 student learning and development. (R4.1)

Rationale Stip 4.1: The EPP provided limited evidence to support the effectiveness of completers and their impact on student learning in the post-preparation classroom, such as a case study.

A focused visit will be held 2 years from the KSBE decision. During the focused visit, the EPP will address the Not Met standard's stipulation(s) and AFIs. Accreditation status after the focused visit can be either Accreditation for 5 years, Accreditation with Stipulation (with all standards Met and one or more stipulations) for 2 years followed by a documents review, OR Revoked Accreditation.

ACCREDITATION REVIEW PROCESS

The responsibilities of the Commissioner and State Board regarding unit accreditation under regulations 91-1-231(d), 91-1-232b and 91-1-70a are as follows:

KSDE's Evaluation Review Committee (ERC) renders accreditation and program approval recommendations for the initial teacher preparation and advanced program levels of the unit. When Kansas has an institution that wishes to initiate a teacher preparation program for the first time, the State Board begins the accreditation process by authorizing a review of documents during a visit to that unit to determine the capacity of that unit to deliver quality preparation programs. After the initial visit, ERC will recommend one of the following accreditation decisions:

Limited Accreditation. This accreditation decision indicates that the unit has the ability to meet the requirements of an educator preparation education institution and the capacity to develop programs for the preparation of educators and has three years before a full accreditation visit is conducted.

Denial of Accreditation. This accreditation decision indicates that the unit has pervasive problems that limit its ability to offer quality programs that adequately prepare quality candidates.

In addition, the Evaluation Review Committee of KSDE and the Accreditation Council of CAEP render separate recommendations/decisions for institutions undergoing their first joint accreditation visit and a continuing accreditation visit. The following accreditation decisions apply to all institutions seeking accreditation.

ACCREDITATION DECISIONS AFTER A CONTINUING ACCREDITATION VISIT

After a continuing accreditation visit, the ERC will render one of the following decisions:

Accreditation. This accreditation decision indicates that the unit meets each of the five KSDE standards for unit accreditation. Areas for improvement may be cited, indicating problems warranting the institution's attention. In its subsequent annual reports, the unit may describe progress made in addressing the areas for improvement cited in KSDE's and/or CAEP's action letters in preparation for its next visit. The next on-site visit is scheduled for seven years following the semester of the continuing accreditation visit.

When one level of the unit receives continuing accreditation and a new level is accredited for the first time, the next accreditation visit will be in seven years if the state agency has agreed to a seven-year cycle of reviews.

Accreditation with Stipulation. This accreditation decision indicates that the unit has met the KSDE standards but has problems that limit its capacity to offer quality programs that adequately prepare candidates.

If accreditation with stipulation is granted, the unit must schedule a documents review two years after the accreditation-with-stipulation decision was rendered. The unit must address the concerns noted in the decision. Following the documents review, the ERC will (1) continue accreditation or (2) revoke

accreditation. If accreditation is continued, the next on-site visit is scheduled for five years after the semester of the documents review; seven years from the earlier full visit.

Probationary Accreditation. This accreditation decision indicates that the unit does not meet one or more of the KSDE standards, and has pervasive problems that limit its capacity to offer quality programs that adequately prepare candidates.

If probationary accreditation is granted, the unit must schedule an on-site visit within two years of the semester in which the probationary decision was rendered. The unit must address all KSDE standards in effect at the time of the probationary review. Following the on-site review, the ERC will (1) continue accreditation or (2) revoke accreditation. If accreditation is continued, the next on-site visit is scheduled for five years after the semester of the probationary visit; seven years from the earlier full visit.

Revocation of Accreditation. Following a comprehensive site visit that occurs as a result of an ERC recommendation to accredit with probation or to accredit with conditions, this accreditation decision indicates that the unit does not meet one or more of the KSDE standards, and has pervasive problems that limit its capacity to offer quality programs that adequately prepare candidates.

³Accreditation can also be revoked by action of the ERC under the following circumstances: (1) following an on-site visit by an accreditation team initiated by a complaint made to KSDE or CAEP; (2) following an on-site visit by an accreditation team initiated by KSDE or CAEP based on concerns arising from an EPP's Annual Report; (3) following a motion from the Kansas State Board of Education or President of CAEP to revoke accreditation on grounds that an accredited unit (a) no longer meets preconditions to accreditation, including but not limited to loss of state approval and/or regional accreditation; (b) refuses to pay the fees that it has been assessed (CAEP); (c) misrepresents its accreditation status to the public; (d) has falsely reported data and/or plagiarized information submitted for accreditation purposes; or (e) fails to submit annual reports or other documents required for accreditation.

PROGRAM REVIEW PROCESS

KSDE's Evaluation Review Committee (ERC) renders program approval recommendations for the initial teacher preparation and advanced program levels of an educator preparation provider (EPP).

PROGRAM DECISIONS

New program approval decisions are:

- New Program Approved with Stipulation
- Not Approved.

Renewal program decisions are:

- Approved
- Approved with Stipulation
- Not Approved.

The responsibilities of the Commissioner and State Board regarding program approval are under regulations 91-1-235 and 91-1-236.

91-1-235. Procedures for initial approval of teacher education programs.

- (a) Application.
- (1) Each teacher education institution that desires to have any new program approved by the state board shall submit an application for program approval to the commissioner. The application shall be submitted at least 12 months before the date of implementation.
- (2) Each institution shall submit with its application a program report containing a detailed description of each proposed program, including program coursework based on standards approved by the state board, and the performance-based assessment system that will be utilized to collect performance data on candidates' knowledge and skills. Each program report shall be in the form and shall contain the information prescribed by the commissioner. The program report shall include confirmation that the candidates in the program will be required to complete the following successfully:
- (A) Coursework that constitutes a major in the subject at the institution or that is equivalent to a major;
- (B) at least 12 weeks of student teaching; and
- (C) a validated preservice candidate work sample.
- (b) Review team. Upon receipt of a program report, a review team shall be appointed by the commissioner to analyze the program report. The chairperson of the review team shall be designated by the commissioner. The number of review team members shall be determined by the commissioner, based upon the scope of the program to be reviewed. Any institution may challenge the appointment of a review team member. The institution's challenge shall be submitted in writing and received by the commissioner no later than 30 days after the notification of review team appointments is sent to the institution. Each challenge to the appointment of a review team member shall be only on the basis of a conflict of interest.
- (c) Program review process.
- (1) In accordance with procedures adopted by the state board, a review team shall examine and analyze the proposed program report and shall prepare a report expressing the findings and conclusions of the review team. The review team's report shall be submitted to the commissioner. The report shall be

forwarded by the commissioner to an appropriate representative designated by the teacher education institution.

- (2) Any institution may prepare a response to the review team's report. This response shall be prepared and submitted to the commissioner no later than 45 days of receipt of the review team's report. Receipt of the review team's report shall be presumed to occur three days after mailing. The review team's report, any response by the institution, and any other supporting documentation shall be forwarded to the evaluation review committee by the commissioner.
- (d) Initial recommendation. The evaluation review committee, in accordance with procedures adopted by the state board, shall prepare a written initial recommendation regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the proposed program, which shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative designated by the teacher education institution and to the commissioner.
- (e) Request for hearing.
- (1) Within 30 days of receipt of an initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee, the teacher education institution may submit a written request by certified mail to the evaluation review committee for a hearing before the committee to appeal the initial recommendation. Receipt of the initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee shall be presumed to occur three days after mailing. This request shall specify, in detail, the basis for the appeal, including an identification of each item disputed by the institution.
- (2) If a request for a hearing is submitted, the evaluation review committee shall conduct a hearing. The committee shall then prepare a written final recommendation regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the proposed program, which shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The final recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative designated by the teacher education institution and to the commissioner. The final recommendation shall be submitted by the commissioner to the state board for its consideration and determination.
- (3) If a request for a hearing is not submitted by certified mail within the time allowed under paragraph (e) (1), the initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee shall become the final recommendation of the review committee. The committee's final recommendation shall be submitted by the commissioner to the state board for its consideration and determination.
- (f) Approval status. Each new program shall be approved with stipulation or not approved.
- (g) Annual report.
- (1) If a new program is approved with stipulation, the institution shall submit a progress report to the commissioner within 60 days after completion of the second semester of operation of the program and thereafter in each of the institution's annual reports that are due on or before July 30.
- (2) Each progress report shall be submitted by the commissioner to the evaluation review committee for its examination and analysis. Following review of the progress report, the evaluation review committee may remove any areas for improvement and change the status to approved until the institution's next program review.
- (h) Change of approval status.
- (1) At any time, the approval status of a teacher education program may be changed by the state board if, after providing an opportunity for a hearing, the state board finds that the institution either has failed to meet substantially the program standards or has materially changed the program. For just cause, the duration of the approval status of a program may be extended by the state board. The duration of the current approval status of a program shall be extended automatically if the program is in the process of being reevaluated by the state board. This extension shall be counted as part of any subsequent approval period of a program.

- (2) At the time of an institution's next on-site visit, the new program shall be reviewed pursuant to K.A.R. 91-1-236.
- (3) For licensure purposes, each teacher education program that is approved with stipulation shall be considered to be approved. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Aug. 6, 2004; amended Aug. 12, 2011; amended July 7, 2017.)

91-1-236. Procedures for renewing approval of teacher education program.

- (a) Application for program renewal.
- (1) Each teacher education institution that desires to have the state board renew the approval status of one or more of its teacher education programs shall submit to the commissioner an application for program renewal. The application shall be submitted at least 12 months before the expiration of the current approval period of the program or programs.
- (2) Each institution shall also submit a program report, which shall be in the form and shall contain the information prescribed by the commissioner. The program report shall be submitted at least six months before the expiration of the current approval period of the program or programs. The program report shall include confirmation that the candidates in the program will be required to complete the following:
- (A) Coursework that constitutes a major in the subject at the institution or that is equivalent to a major; and
- (B) at least 12 weeks of student teaching.
- (b) Review team. Upon receipt of a complete program report, a review team shall be appointed by the commissioner to analyze the program report. The chairperson of the review team shall be designated by the commissioner. The number of review team members shall be determined by the commissioner, based upon the scope of the program or programs to be reviewed. An institution may challenge the appointment of a review team member only on the basis of a conflict of interest.
- (c) Program review process.
- (1) In accordance with procedures adopted by the state board, each review team shall examine and analyze the program report and prepare a review report expressing the findings and conclusions of the review team. The review team's report shall be submitted to the commissioner. The report shall be forwarded by the commissioner to an appropriate representative of the teacher education institution.
- (2) Any institution may prepare a written response to the review team's report. Each response shall be prepared and submitted to the commissioner within 45 days of receipt of the review team's report. The review team's report, any response filed by the institution, and any other supporting documentation shall be forwarded by the commissioner to the evaluation review committee.
- (d) Initial recommendation. The evaluation review committee, in accordance with procedures adopted by the state board, shall prepare a written initial recommendation regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the program or programs, which shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative of the teacher education institution and to the commissioner.
- (e) Request for hearing.
- (1) Within 30 days of the receipt of an initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee, the teacher education institution may submit a written request to the commissioner for a hearing before the evaluation review committee to appeal the initial recommendation of the committee. This request shall specify, in detail, the basis for the appeal, including an identification of each item disputed by the institution.

- (2) If a request for a hearing is submitted, the evaluation review committee shall conduct a hearing. The committee shall then prepare a written final recommendation regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the program or programs, which shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The final recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative of the teacher education institution and to the commissioner. The final recommendation shall be submitted by the commissioner to the state board for its consideration and determination of program approval status according to paragraph (f)(1).
- (3) If a request for a hearing is not submitted within the time allowed under paragraph (1) of this subsection, the initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee shall become the final recommendation of the review committee. The committee's final recommendation shall be submitted by the commissioner to the state board for its consideration and determination.
- (f) Approval status.
- (1) The status assigned to any teacher education program specified in this regulation shall be approved, approved with stipulation, or not approved.
- (2) Subject to subsequent action by the state board, the assignment of approved status to a teacher education program shall be effective for seven academic years. However, the state board, at any time, may change the approval status of a program if, after providing an opportunity for a hearing, the state board finds that the institution either has failed to meet substantially the program standards adopted by the state board or has made a material change in a program. For just cause, the duration of the approval status of a program may be extended by the state board. The duration of the approval status of a program shall be extended automatically if the program is in the process of being reevaluated by the state board.
- (3) (A) If a program is approved with stipulation, that status shall be effective for the period of time specified by the state board, which shall not exceed seven years.
- (B) If any program of a teacher education institution is approved with stipulation, the institution shall include in an upgrade report to the commissioner the steps that the institution has taken and the progress that the institution has made during the previous academic year to address the deficiencies that were identified in the initial program review.
- (C) The upgrade report shall be submitted by the commissioner to the evaluation review committee for its examination and analysis. After this examination and analysis, the evaluation review committee shall prepare a written recommendation regarding the status to be assigned to the teacher education program for the succeeding academic years. The recommendation shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative of the teacher education institution and to the commissioner. If the institution does not agree with this recommendation, the institution may request a hearing according to the provisions in subsection (e).
- (D) For licensure purposes, each teacher education program that is approved with stipulation shall be considered to be approved.
- (4) Students shall be allowed two full, consecutive, regular semesters following the notification of final action by the state board to complete a program that is not approved. Summers and interterms shall not be counted as part of the two regular semesters. Students who finish within these two regular semesters may be recommended for licensure by the college or university. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Aug. 6, 2004; amended Aug. 12, 2011.)

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education accept the recommendations of the Licensure Review Committee as presented.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

Recommendations of the Licensure Review Committee (LRC) need approval of the State Board of Education. Licenses will be issued to those applicants whose requests are granted. Requests and the LRC's recommendations for this month are provided below.

Case # 3521

Requests professional-level Kansas teaching license for Music (PRK-12).

The district(s) must submit an application verifying that the individual teacher for whom they are requesting the waiver is currently working toward achieving the appropriate endorsement on his/her license. A review of the waiver application is completed before the waiver is recommended for approval.

The attached requests have been reviewed by the Teacher Licensure staff and are being forwarded to the State Board of Education for action. If approved, school districts will be able to use the individuals in an area outside the endorsement on their license, and in the area for which they have submitted an approved plan of study. The waiver is valid for one school year.

Act on request to consent to initiate the contract bid process for an Education Technology Coordinator for E-Rate.

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education authorize the Commissioner of Education to initiate the contract bid process for Education Technology Coordinator in an amount not to exceed \$45,000 for the period of one year with the option to renew for four additional years (July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2030) for a total of \$225,000 over five years.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

Kansas schools are eligible for reimbursement of some technology costs through the federal E-Rate program; however, applying for these federal reimbursement funds involves a complex, detailed application process. KSDE will contract with a provider with proven expertise regarding the E-Rate application process, to provide daily telephone access for all Kansas school districts and service centers regarding any and all questions involved with the federal E-Rate program.

The vendor will provide a toll-free telephone number to answer questions from client locations, Monday-Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. CST, excluding public holidays. Voicemail and email support shall be available at all other times. The vendor will also provide annually six up-to-date onsite trainings throughout the State of Kansas regarding E-Rate services and the process for submitting for these funds. KSDE will be allowed to video these trainings and post them to the KSDE website. The vendor will also provide a progress/performance report at the end of each quarter during the contract period. Additional services in providing USDs with E-Rate training, filing assistance, and performance monitoring and improvement will be provided on an ad hoc basis at the request of KSDE.
