Blue Ribbon Task Force on Student Screen Time October 17, 2024

The ninth meeting of the Blue Ribbon Task Force on Student Screen Time began at 4:00 p.m. on October 17, 2024. The meeting was virtual.

Co-Chairs: Principal Brian Houghton and Student Ava Gustin.

Statement of Purpose

Develop guidance/recommendations, based in research, on:

- students' personal device use in school,
- screen time and mental health, and
- parental oversight of district-owned devices.

Welcome from Commissioner Watson

Dr. Watson welcomed the members of the task force.

Co-Chair Student Ava Gustin greeted everyone and asked Payton Lynn to review the two documents that were sent out to the task force on October 16th.

Payton Lynn screen shared the document on Recommendations and then on Voting Procedures:

Task Force Recommendations and Voting Procedures Overview

How Motions Will Work

The task force will have all the recommended motions available in the Motion Recommendation document. The motions will be in a specific order to help with efficiency. We ordered the recommendations based on two things: (1) items that had a large majority and (2) ordered in a way that does not contradict another.

How Voting Will Work

After a motion is presented and seconded, there will be up to 10 minutes for discussion. Individuals will be called upon after raising their hand. Once the discussion ends or time runs out, a voting poll will appear on your screen where you can choose to vote 'yes,' 'no,' or abstain. Please note, abstentions will be recorded but not counted toward the majority vote requirement. A motion passes if it receives a majority of 'yes' votes among the total 'yes' and 'no' votes. For example, if 30 people vote and 5 abstain, only 25 votes are counted, requiring 13 'yes' votes for a majority.

General Discussion (Breakout Rooms - 10 min):

Discuss your thoughts, weigh the pros and cons of the recommendations, and consider the following guiding questions:

- Does the research support this recommendation?
- Does this recommendation empower local control?
- Who bears the responsibility for enforcing this recommendation?
- Does it place an excessive or unrealistic burden on any group?
- Are there financial implications?
- Is it realistic in both theory and practice?
- Are we aware of potential benefits or success stories related to the recommendation?
- Does this fall within the authority of the KS State Board of Education?

Co-Chair student Ava explained that because there was a breakout discussion on the personal device topic last week, it would not be repeated this week. Co-Chair Principal Houghton noted that during discussion, members of the task force will need to raise their hands (in the app) and be called on by one of the chairs. Members should not interrupt others who are speaking. If there is continuous interruption, muting or removal from the meeting will be necessary.

Ava referred to the Motion Recommendations document (inserted below), explaining that next to each recommendation is a note showing where, breakout room or submission by task force member, this particular idea came from. Also, the document is re-formatted to group together similar motions.

Principal Houghton stated that motions can be amended, as a friendly amendment if the originator of the motion agrees.
