CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Jim Porter called the monthly meeting of the Kansas State Board of Education to order at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, March 8, 2022, in the Board Room of the Landon State Office Building, 900 SW Jackson St., Topeka, Kansas. The meeting began 30 minutes early this day because the National Weather Service was scheduled to conduct a statewide tornado drill at 10 a.m. as part of Severe Weather Preparedness Week.

STATE BOARD MISSION STATEMENT, MOMENT OF SILENCE AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Chairman Porter read both the Board's Mission Statement and Kansans Can Vision Statement. He then asked for a moment of silence after which the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Dr. Horst moved to approve the day's agenda. Mrs. Clifford seconded. Mrs. Dombrosky then asked to vote on consent agenda items 19 g, h, i, j, k separately from the other consent items. Dr. Horst and Mrs. Clifford agreed. Motion carried 10-0.

APPROVAL OF THE FEBRUARY MEETING MINUTES

Mr. Jones moved to approve the minutes of the Feb. 8 and 9 regular Board meeting. Dr. Horst seconded. Motion carried 10-0.

RECEIVE RECOMMENDATIONS FROM COMMISSION FOR RACIAL EQUITY AND JUSTICE

Dr. Shannon Portillo, Co-Chair of the Governor's Commission for Racial Equity and Justice (CREJ), was invited to share recommendations cited in the Commission's two reports. Dr. Portillo is Associate Dean for Academic Affairs at the University of Kansas Edwards Campus. The first report in 2020 contained recommendations specific to law enforcement and policing. The second report in 2021, focused on a broader discussion of social determinants of health based on studying racial equity within economic systems, education and health care. She provided an overview of the content, noting actionable recommendations for the areas of maximizing federal funding, universal equity policies, teacher diversity, eliminating school mascots with Native American names or imagery, housing and homelessness, workforce and behavioral health. Dr. Portillo answered Board members' questions about barriers, cultural awareness and community engagement.

SEVERE WEATHER PREPAREDNESS WEEK DRILL

The National Weather Service in Topeka conducted a statewide tornado drill at 10 a.m. Tuesday. State Board members participated in the drill as part of Severe Weather Preparedness Week, March 7-11. Members returned to the Board Room at approximately 10:15.

CITIZENS' OPEN FORUM

Chairman Porter declared the Citizens' Forum open at 10:18 a.m., but announced that speakers would be accepted until 10:30. Speakers and their topics were: Susie Wilbur, Topeka — requests for consideration regarding Native American comments; Sharon Knewtson, Olathe — legislation impacting students at Kansas School for the Deaf. The Citizens' Forum remained open until 10:30 a.m., then Chairman Porter closed the Forum.

ACTION TO ESTABLISH ADVISORY COUNCIL FOR GUIDANCE AND RECOMMENDATIONS TO INCREASE STUDENT LITERACY SKILLS

Information about achieving literacy by third grade and implementing recommendations from the Dyslexia Task Force was presented to the State Board in February. The development of a long-term advisory council was discussed. Dr. Laurie Curtis, Early Literacy/Dyslexia Program Manager at KSDE, updated members on the proposed development of a Literacy Advisory Council comprised of individuals representing different stakeholder groups. Members on the Council are yet to be determined, but will bring diverse experiences to a common goal. The purpose will be to monitor and report on initiatives, serve as a resource, identify needs and be a supportive body. Dr. Horst moved to approve the establishment of a Literacy Advisory Council for the purpose of helping support and advance gains in literacy achievement for all Kansas students. Mr. McNiece seconded. Motion carried 10-0.

ACTION ON ESSER EXPENDITURE PLANS FOR USE OF FEDERAL COVID-19 RELIEF FUNDS

Assistant Director Doug Boline reported on the most recent ESSER Task Force recommendations, including one change request. The ESSER III applications for consideration this month were mostly from smaller districts, with their primarily needs identified as teaching and learning. Mr. Boline also noted that eight of the 29 district applications conditionally approved at last month's State Board meeting have been resubmitted with complete narratives. Mr. Jones moved to accept the recommendations of the Commissioner's Task Force on ESSER and EANS Distribution of Money and approve the public school district expenditure plans for ESSER III and ESSER II change request as presented for use of federal COVID-19 relief funds. Mrs. Mah seconded. There was continued discussion about two specific projects — a playground and an activity bus. Motion carried 9-0-1 with Mrs. Dombrosky abstaining.

Members took a break until 11:25 a.m.

ACTION ON RECOMMENDATION FOR KANSAS CITY TEACHER RESIDENCY PROGRAM

Dr. Mischel Miller further explained about the pilot opportunity the Kansas City Teacher Residency program is offering to fulfill some teacher vacancies in Kansas City elementary schools. She reviewed the timeline of the pilot year, emphasizing the residency element. There were several questions during the presentation, including ones about other similar programs, the accreditation process and what other states are doing to recruit teachers. Mrs. Mah moved to approve the Kansas City Teacher Residency Program as an alternative elementary licensure pilot for elementary teaching dependent upon meeting program review and approval. Mrs. Arnold seconded. There was further discussion. KCTR representatives answered questions about funding, faculty qualifications and coursework. Mr. McNiece asked that the motion include a time reference. Mrs. Mah restated the motion to approve the Kansas City Teacher Residency Program as an alternative elementary licensure pilot for elementary licensure pilot for elementary teaching the motion include a time reference. RECOGNITION OF 2021 NATIONAL ESEA DISTINGUISHED SCHOOLS FROM KANSAS

Two Kansas schools have been named National ESEA Distinguished Schools through the Elementary and Secondary Education Act's program to recognize qualifying schools for their educational advances in specific categories. Lincoln Memorial Elementary School in Caney USD 436 and Bertram Caruthers Elementary School in Kansas City Kansas USD 500 are the honorees from Kansas for 2021. KSDE Assistant Director Tate Toedman introduced leaders from these schools who then shared their strategies for helping students as well as teachers succeed. They also reported on what they learned by attending the National ESEA Conference in Louisiana.

ACTION ON REQUEST FROM HAYSVILLE USD 261 FOR RECESS PILOT EXTENSION

Haysville USD 261 Superintendent Jeff Hersh and Assistant Superintendent Jennifer Reed participated in the meeting virtually to request an extension of the pilot RECESS, which blends Recreation, Engagement, Communication, Exploration, Social-Emotional, Success. They answered questions and addressed members' concerns about reduced instruction time. Members requested concrete data to show program success. Mr. Jones moved to accept a request from Haysville USD 261 to extend its RECESS pilot at the elementary school another year allowing four 15-minute recess periods to count toward instruction time. Mrs. Haas seconded. Motion carried 10-0.

RECOGNITION OF 2021 NATIONAL BLUE RIBBON SCHOOLS FROM KANSAS

The National Blue Ribbon Schools Program recognizes schools whose students achieve at very high levels or are making significant progress in closing achievement gaps among different groups of students. Kansas schools honored in 2021 are: Ellsworth Elementary, Ellsworth USD 327; Grandview Elementary, El Dorado USD 490; Mahaffie Elementary, Olathe USD 233; Roosevelt Elementary, Hays USD 489; and Sabetha Elementary School, Prairie Hills USD 113. Leaders from these schools shared with Board members the factors they have found to be most significant in raising student achievement at their schools. Areas mentioned included tiered systems of support, successful professional learning communities, and small group instruction.

Members took a 10-minute break until 3:20 p.m.

ACTION ON RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PROFESSIONAL PRACTICES COMMISSION

Professional Practices Commission Chair Jennifer Holt attended the meeting virtually to review current cases presented for action. She summarized the situations and answered questions. Board members discussed the PPC's recommendation on 21-PPC-19 and asked for additional evidence, including a recording of the PPC hearing/testimony. Mr. Jones moved to table the decision in case 21-PPC-19 until the next State Board meeting, pending further review and issuance of the video. Dr. Horst seconded. Motion carried 9-0-1 with Mrs. Arnold abstaining.

Next, Dr. Horst moved to deny the application for an Emergency Substitute License in case 21-PPC-20. Mrs. Dombrosky seconded. Motion carried 10-0.

KANSANS CAN HIGHLIGHT: HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION

Through the Kansans Can Star Recognition Program, the State Board and KSDE recognize district success in each of the outcome areas that Kansans have indicated they value in the state's education system. The High School Graduation Star Award is given to those districts with graduation rates above the state average, with the highest recognition for those districts at or above 95

percent. Valley Falls USD 338 was one of several districts receiving this award. Principals Susan Grey and Greg Morgan explained that graduation success starts long before high school. Relationship building within the community, especially with parents, was cited as essential. Expansion of career tech pathway offerings, service learning opportunities and dual credit flexibility are a few of the many ways the district works with students to provide personalized learning.

LEGISLATIVE MATTERS AND LEGISLATIVE LIAISON REPORTS

Acting Commissioner Dr. Craig Neuenswander began his report with a summary of education bills, primarily newer ones. The legislators have returned from turnaround and are in the middle of the second half of the session. Dr. Neuenswander provided a printed summary of selected House and Senate bills followed this session. He updated members on the status of specific bills and upcoming hearings. He also noted that the K-12 budget is starting to be worked. There was discussion about a number of bills. Board members granted consensus for the Board's legislative liaisons to oppose, on behalf of the State Board, any proposed legislation that limits safety requirements on school transportation vehicles.

ACTION ON APPOINTMENT OF STATE BOARD MEMBER TO KSHSAA BOARD

The Kansas State High School Activities Association Board of Directors consists of not less than 60 members. Kansas Statute states that at least two directors shall be representatives of the State Board of Education, appointed by the State Board. Current representatives are Jim McNiece, whose term continues to June 30, 2023, and Deena Horst, whose term ends June 30, 2022. Dr. Horst also serves on the KSHSAA Executive Board. Mr. McNiece moved that Deena Horst serve another two-year term on the KSHSAA Board of Directors, beginning July 1, 2022, and continue her appointment on the Executive Board. Mrs. Dombrosky seconded. Motion carried 10-0.

ACTION ON BOARD ATTORNEY CONTRACT RENEWAL

The support of students' Individual Plan of Study is another key element in helping Kansas students be successful, both now and in their postsecondary plans. Nemaha Central USD 115 is the single Silver Star recipient in the IPS category as acknowledged through the Kansans Can Star Recognition program for 2021. The pilot is called RECESS for "Recreation, Engagement, Communication, Exploration, Social-Emotional, Success." Item Title: Receive Accreditation Review Council recommendations for KESA

From: Jeannette Nobo

This school year, 2021-2022, ninety-two (92) systems (80 public, 1 state, and 11 private) are scheduled for accreditation. Of these 92 systems, 37 entered the KESA process as year one. Thirty-five did not take a pause year, while two systems paused and then requested to be accredited with its cohort. All remaining systems, entered as year two systems; meaning if the pause would not have been available, they would have been scheduled for accreditation in 2020-2021.

Beginning this month and through the month of July, it is expected that the State Board will receive the Accreditation Review Council's (ARC) accreditation recommendation for all 92 systems. The State Board will have the opportunity to receive the ARC's recommendation (Executive Summary) a month prior to acting on the accreditation recommendation.

In April, the ARC met and took its action on the accreditation recommendation for two public systems. These two systems are:

- DO232 De Soto
- DO446 Independence

These two systems will be brought forth as an action item at the May 2022 State Board meeting. KSDE accreditation staff will share the ARC's review process, system findings and accreditation status recommendations.

Executive Summary/AFI

1. Compliance areas are assuredly addressed.

ARC Comment

Per KSDE, the system has fulfilled all applicable requirements and deadlines/timelines or is actively working to meet compliance.

2. Foundational areas are assuredly addressed.

ARC Comment

As evidenced in the OVT report, the De Soto System implemented committees to audit existing practices, identify needs, and develop strategies to 'reset' their MTSS Framework. The committees identified several key areas to address operational protocols, tools for screening and monitoring student progress, and resources for instruction.

• Tiered Framework of Supports

The OVT report provided evidence that the De Soto School System had addressed all areas of its Tiered Framework of Support. The OVT stated in its report that the system's adoption of BrightBytes was a driving factor in creating a comprehensive narrative of student needs. District teams spoke to the ability to house all the available data within one platform. As the tiered framework evolved, the introduction of BrightBytes ensured that all data was used collectively. The team also spoke to the ability to document intervention efforts within the platform. Progress monitoring and transitioning students across grade levels became a more efficient and effective process as well.

• Family, Business, and Community Partnerships

To grow in relevance, the district focused on establishing partnerships with industry leaders. Many of these partnerships have been fostered by the USD 232 Education Foundation, the Kauffman Foundation, and the district's CTE Coordinator. The partnerships have resulted in a variety of support for student learning. This was evident in students being directly connected to industry professionals and engaging in career talks, mentorships, and client-connected projects. In the past five years, the district has made progress in leveraging community resources for improved learning experiences for students and staff. The district-developed Veteran's Day events are a standout as they not only engage several stakeholder groups but integrate learning around civic responsibility.

• Diversity, Equity, and Access

According to the reports of the System and OVT, this was an area of growth for the district. In years one and two they did studies and surveys. In year three a Parent Advisory Committee was formed to gather feedback. The school district was offered the opportunity in Year 4 to join a cohort of districts working with the Kauffman Foundation on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI). As part of the cohort, a representative team from the De Soto School system was engaged in professional learning opportunities that guide the DEI work of KESA. The initial work with the Kauffman Foundation included

an Equity Audit to identify potential areas of growth and improvement. Using this data, the district plans to develop an improvement plan that highlights specific priorities for DEI. System leaders discussed the goal of making 'Belongingness and Inclusion' a systemic effort as part of the next accreditation cycle

• Communication and Basic Skills

The system reported that over the past five years, access to resources for students receiving ELL services has increased. In Year 3 of the KESA cycle, all students received electronic devices which the team directly attributes to greater success within this Foundational Structure. The OVT would like to highlight the system's efforts to improve the instructional capacity of teachers to best serve student needs. In the past five years, the district has made professional learning a priority, specifically regarding structured literacy. The system now has three Reading Specialists that are trained LETRS Facilitators and have an active cohort of teachers engaging in LETRS training. Sonday and Number Worlds are examples of the instructional resources that the System uses.

• Civic and Social Engagement

The system provided evidence of many projects/events that were noted as having strengthened their civic and social engagement. The system listed at the K-2 building, Community Service Day, 12 Days of Kindness; the 3-5 building Safety Patrol, Student Council assembly, ambassadors, and recycling team; at the 6-12 buildings Weekly community emails, Project SAFE, Student Council Relay for Life, and Community Week. This is just a partial listing of events/projects.

• Physical and Mental Health

As evidenced in the OVT report, the system supports families in mental health and the district has initiated a parent education series. Families have been invited to webinars, workshops, and screenings of documentaries around pressing mental health concerns. Parents serving on the System Site Council highlighted these opportunities as making them better informed and prepared to support their children. In 2018, the school system received the Platinum certification for workplace wellness awarded by the Greater KC Chamber of Commerce as a part of their Healthy KC initiative. Despite already being recognized as outstanding in the area of workplace wellness, the school system ramped up its efforts to support staff in response to the stressors of COVID. The system developed wellness rooms, self-care websites, and initiated teletherapy services.

• Arts and Cultural Appreciation

The OVT observed a series of events across the KESA cycle to improve the access to the arts in each school. All levels are engaging students in musical theater, band or orchestra, and district art shows. Events such as 'Holidays Around the World' are developing a sense of cultural appreciation in students. Read Across America has connected students with a more diverse body of literature.

• Postsecondary and Career Preparation

The OVT commended the De Soto School System for its significant progress in postsecondary and career preparation. Four (4) initiatives are particularly noteworthy: 1) the initiation of Individual Plans of Study (IPS), 2) Middle school pathways class, 3) Increased access to pathways and AP courses, and 4) the opening of the Cedar Trails Exploration Center.

Early in the KESA cycle, students began engaging with Xello to explore their interests and hone in on their strengths. Throughout middle school, students explore options for career paths and learn about the universities, trade schools, and organizations that offer postsecondary learning in their desired field. As they enter high school, a 4-year plan is developed with the guidance of the counselor to make course selections that align with their career interests.

The OVT enjoyed conducting the Year 5 visit in the Cedar Trails Exploration Center, which opened to students this school year. The increase in pathway opportunities required specialized learning environments. To meet the needs of students, the system and its community partners built the CTE

Center to connect students with the tools necessary to advance in specific fields such as engineering, biotechnology, and graphic design. Additionally, the CTE Center includes an Early Childhood Program. The youngest learners in the district now have access to facilities and resources that set them up on a path for academic and social success.

3. Evidence is **generally** documented that **Goal 1 (N/A)** activities and strategies were identified, implemented and produced reasonable results.

ARC Comment

Goal 1: Improve achievement for all students while reducing the achievement disparities of various disaggregated groups.

It was noted by the OVT that the system made a significant increase in years two and three however the effects of the COVID shutdown and subsequent learning environment made progress towards the goal a challenge. The OVT saw significant improvement in the area of relevant learning, particularly with regard to postsecondary and career preparation. The OVT asserts that the progress made has been impressive, given the challenges presented by school closures and COVID mitigation measures.

4. Evidence is **generally** documented that **Goal 2 (N/A)** activities and strategies were identified, implemented and produced reasonable results.

ARC Comment

Goal 2: Increase family and community engagement with 12/12 schools. Increase community awareness of USD 232 at 100% of the district and building, 2017-2022

Some of the ways the system has improved community engagement are:

- Quarterly updates on school district progress in the online publication What's New in USD 232
- Strong feedback loops through District Site Council, Building Site Councils, and Parent Advisory Committees

• Maintenance of a professional directory of industry partners for the purpose of Career Talks/Fairs, Job Shadows, Mentorships, Internships, and Client-Connected Projects

• Parent education series of webinars, workshops, and documentaries to support families with mental health concerns

• Regular engagement events that bring families and community into the schools, as well as events that bring kids into the community

5. Evidence is **assuredly** documented that policies, procedures, and regulations guiding the system for the purpose of long-term sustainability have been created and or updated.

ARC Comment

The system invested time and energy into developing specific teams to guide the improvement process. The teams are representative of all stakeholders: students, staff, parents, community, and industry. Additionally, the system has invested in developing a system for ongoing communication and feedback. Procedures for identifying, diagnosing, and serving intervention needs underwent significant revision during the KESA cycle. The framework for Multi-Tiered Systems of Support is perhaps the best example of systemic change that has been made sustainable for future years. Additionally, curricular and course revisions to embed Individual Plans of Study directly into the day-to-day learning of the students have become an important, but still sustainable change. Financial and human resources have been allocated appropriately for the system to make progress toward the goal areas.

6. The evidence submitted to the Accreditation Review Council indicates the system does **assuredly** demonstrate significant gains in meeting the expectations of the Kansas Vision for Education and State Board Outcomes.

ARC Comment

Star Award Recognition: -The Kansas State Department of Education has eight Star Recognition Awards. USD 232 received the following:

- Commissioner's Award Graduation- Gold
- Social-Emotional Growth- Silver
- Postsecondary Effectiveness- Silver Academic
- Preparedness for Postsecondary Success- Bronze
- Individual Plan of Study- Bronze

According to the system's report, they were one of two systems in the state that received five state Star Recognition awards.

With regard to the vision for Education, De Soto is ensuring that students are successful high school grates through:

<u>Academic Preparation</u>

The system offers a PreK-12 curriculum that is aligned with the Kansas College and Career Ready Standards. Recently revised curriculum guides to ensure both academic rigor and relevance are evident in the curriculum. There is also a cycle in place for curriculum review and revision, making this a sustainable process in future cycles. The System has a balanced approach to assessment with screening tools, diagnostic tools, and classroom-based assessments. With these tools and a cohesive approach to assessing, the system can monitor the effectiveness of the curriculum and monitor the academic progress of individual students.

<u>Cognitive Preparation</u>

As noted in the OVT report Students in the system learn strategies intended to help them formulate problems, conduct research, interpret and communicate information with precision and accuracy. Strategies address memory, critical thinking, imagination, and metacognition. These are evident in the district curriculum and are monitored through classroom observations.

• Technical Skills

Work-based experiences are integrated at all levels of learning. Experiences include career fairs, career talks, mentorships, job shadows, client-connected projects, and internships. These opportunities are hands-on and not only create greater awareness of careers but are designed to help students identify professions of interest and personal strengths.

<u>Employability Skills</u>

Through the SEL work, the district is addressing skills including Self-Regulation, Self-Efficacy, Self-Awareness, Assertiveness, Empathy, and Conflict Management. Additionally, etiquette, public speaking, adaptability, honesty, collaboration, patience, enthusiasm, and confidence are addressed.

<u>Civic Engagement</u>

The system has also initiated a social studies curriculum revision with the intent to integrate civic engagement into the curriculum. Leadership opportunities at all levels allow students the opportunity to make changes at the local level.

Board Outcomes







The percentage of students who scored at Levels 3 and 4 on the state assessment.









Percent at Levels 3 and 4








Percent at Levels 3 and 4

Executive Summary/AFI

1. Compliance areas are assuredly addressed.

ARC Comment

The system has fulfilled all applicable compliance requirements or is actively working to meet compliance as verified by KSDE.

2. Foundational areas are generally addressed.

ARC Comment

Based on the information provided in the System's Accreditation Engagement Review; the system does have in place and has defined Foundational Structures. Cognia review ratings are:

• Insufficient - Identifies areas with insufficient evidence or evidence that indicated little or no activity leading toward improvement

- Initiating Represents areas to enhance and extend current improvement efforts
- Improving Pinpoints quality practices that are improving and meet the Standards
- Impacting Demonstrates noteworthy practices producing clear results that positively impact the institution.

The ratings in this area were as follows:

Tiered Framework of Support

The system received both improving and impacting levels in this foundational area. Improving means that there are quality practices within the system that are improving and meet the expected standards. Impacting means that the system demonstrates noteworthy practices producing clear results that positively impact the institution. Some examples: Teachers at Independence collaborate with peers, collect and use student data to drive decisions, and use flexible grouping to meet the individual needs of each learner. Data is used to develop strategies with Student Improvement Plan (SIP) teams. However, while there are opportunities evident that are challenging activities for learners such as after-school clubs, Math clubs, etc.; there was little evidence of consistent differentiation within all classrooms.

Family, Communities, and Business Partnerships

According to the Cognia Accreditation Engagement Review, the system is at an Impacting level in this area. Parent interviews and survey data indicate that teachers care for students and work to meet students' individual needs. Parents reported they could approach and would be heard by the administration regarding any issue. Teachers respect each other, collaborate willingly, and enjoy spending time together. They work as a team to support and invest in all students they encounter, not just those in their classes. The team also reviewed the survey data and analysis provided by the school regarding the mission and vision. It determined that the entire process showed that fidelity was both a useful reinforcement of the school's efforts and a clear indication that the leadership was listening to the community. Parents provided examples of how the school leadership was committed to using their feedback to the community.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

The system is at the Improving level for monitoring and adjusting instruction to meet individual learners' needs. The institution does provide a process to identify and address the specialized needs of learners, however, the institution can improve on developing opportunities to monitor and adjust to meet individual needs in the classroom. Parents were concerned that a communication structure was needed on what support systems are offered by the district.

Communication and Basic Skills

Educators in the system implement a curriculum based on high expectations and prepare learners for their next levels. There is Impacting evidence that the institution provides a culture that promotes creativity, innovation, and collaborative problem-solving. The institution also aligns the curriculum to standards and best practices.

Civic and Social Engagement

All these prospects are the results of intentional efforts on behalf of an effective school administration. While it was clear to the team that the community was engaged, it was less evident how their engagement translated into goals. USD 446 is encouraged to incorporate documentation as to the connections between community engagement and goals.

Physical and Mental Health

The system provides access to information resources and materials to support the curriculum, programs, and needs of students, staff, and the system.

Arts and Cultural Appreciation

Educators implement a curriculum based on high expectations and prepare learners for their next levels. This includes wide opportunities for students to explore the arts and culture of the community.

Postsecondary and Career Preparation

Long-term interaction with a caring mentor, who helps guide future paths helps build strong relationships between students and the mentor, warrants future success. Advisory periods and class meetings are held throughout the system to ensure regular contact with students, ascertain academic progress, and monitor social/emotional needs. As part of advocacy, the system also actively promotes career planning. Students have multiple opportunities from the entrance to the school to graduation to have help and assistance with career planning. Individual Plan of Study (IPS) teams are utilized to help students explore future careers. Advocacy is provided through the school counselor to help students develop appropriate plans. The system also provides Xello as a tool for career exploration, coupled with advocacy. Finally, a multitude of internships and opportunities for community involvement are available. Not only do these experiences assist students with career exploration, but they provide another form of advocacy to support future success.

3. Evidence is **assuredly** documented that **Goal 1 (N/A)** activities and strategies were identified, implemented, and produced reasonable results.

ARC Comment

DISTRICT Goal 1: Enhance... academics through the expansion of early childhood education, the use of educational technology, and by providing curriculum resources as needed to support teaching and learning. (Rigor, Relevance)

Basic Strategies/Outcomes: 1) Expand the Pre-school; 2) Prioritize a technology budget; 3) Prioritize a textbook/curriculum budget; 4) Utilize blended learning - Instructor lead instruction and computer-based instruction.

Progress Goal 1a (Early Childhood Education): The primary goal when was to establish the Early Learning Center and add preschool opportunities already offered in Independence by serving the

neediest students. In the 2019-20 school year, the early learning center served 120 students, 97% of which were SPED or at-risk.

4. Evidence is **assuredly** documented that **Goal 2 (N/A)** activities and strategies were identified, implemented, and produced reasonable results.

ARC Comment

DISTRICT Goal 2: Improve... the academic foundation for all students with the implementation of a district-wide technology-based individualized instruction literacy program. (Rigor, Relevance) Basic Strategies/Outcomes: 1) utilize blended learning—instructor and computer-based individualized instruction; 2) purchase Lexia Core 5 license to utilize daily with all students in grades K-5 and select students in grade 6-8; 3) purchase Reading Plus license to utilize daily with all students in grade 6-8 and select students in grades 4, 5, and 9.; 4) purchase ILit license to utilize daily with students below grade level in reading—grades 9-10 and select students 11-12.

Progress Goal 2: This is the system's third year of implementation of the Lexia Core 5 program at Eisenhower and Jefferson at all grades, and Reading Plus at IMS all grades, 20 minutes per day 4 days per week for all students with additional time through Title and Kids Crew. Data shows progress is being made on the goal to decrease the number of non-proficient readers.

5. Evidence is **generally** documented that policies, procedures, and regulations guiding the system for long-term sustainability have been created and or updated.

ARC Comment

The institution, the school board, and staff engage in a continuous improvement process. Some measurable results support student learning. Data was limited. The school council and leadership provided a strategic plan that includes the use of resources that supports the institution's direction.

 The evidence submitted to the Accreditation Review Council indicates the system does generally demonstrate significant gains in meeting the expectations of the Kansas Vision for Education and State Board Outcomes.

ARC Comment

Evidence submitted generally showed gains. There was a strong emphasis on the culture of the school. Generally, the State Board outcomes were evident in specific areas. Some of the programs seemed to be recently implemented.

Board Outcomes

Social-Emotional Growth	Independence addresses character education K-5 and is in Year 3 in the implementation of social-emotional classes for all students at Independence Middle School (IMS), utilizing the Social Emotional Learning Standards. They are also in Year 2, in the implementation of the Second Step curriculum to guide the social-emotional curriculum at Riley Early Learning Center and IMS. USD 446 implements service learning as a graduation requirement. This requirement, however, was waived for the 2019-20 graduates due to the pandemic. It was stated that the system touched more pre-kindergarten students at their preschool during 2019-20 with what they called "record enrollment", and the curriculum is heavy on Social-Emotional Standards. According to the visiting team, data shared showed huge gains in social-emotional growth, even though they were unable to administer the assessment that monitors this in Spring
	unable to administer the assessment that monitors this in Spring 2020 due to the gandemic. Additionally, Independence

Kindergarten Readiness	administers the Communities that Care Survey annually. Data from this survey indicates the percentage of students 'at risk' for each SEL standard and compares the district to the state. The 2020 data indicates that the district has made gains in the area of character development, but remains more at risk in every other category of the social-emotional report than the Kansas rate. USD 446 is in Year 3 implementation of the Ages and Stages-3 Questionnaire and the Ages and Stages Social Emotional-2 Questionnaire at Riley Early Learning Center (3/4-year-olds) and Eisenhower Elementary (Kindergarten). Teachers analyze this data to 1) Embed opportunities into meaningful routines across the daily schedule with many opportunities to practice; 2) Provide small group, targeted instruction for the student; and 3) Utilize the ASQ Learning Activities resource manual and ASQ site for ideas to address specific skill deficits. Also, see Kindergarten Readiness data is part of Goal 1.
Individual Plans of Study	Independence Middle continues to utilize Xello for career exploration. Teachers at IMS and IHS attended multiple professional development sessions with Xello staff and decided to migrate to the Xello platform from Career Cruising for the 2020-21 school year. They are in Year 3 implementation of classes at IMS that are specifically designed to engage students in career exploration such as Authors/Illustrators, Digital Authors, Personal Finance, Leadership, Music/Dance, Community Connections, Team Building, Intro to Journalism, Healthy Living, and Ceramics. IMS explored the idea of student-led conferences, but put that concept on hold during the 2019-20 school year due to the pandemic. At Independence High, students continue to develop/revise their IPS through Advisory as well as explore career opportunities utilizing Xello (having migrated from the Career Cruising platform this year) for career exploration. This would be in Year 3 of implementation of the student-led conference at IHS; however, due to the pandemic, this practice has been postponed for now.
High School Graduation Rate	Some data is disaggregated by subgroups and demonstrates that some students are improving and some gaps are at a decline. ACT data is within 2 points of the state average or above.
Postsecondary Success	USD 446's goal is to prepare students for whatever pathway they choose upon graduation: college, the workforce, or a myriad of other paths. That starts with successfully completing high school. Data shows students' post-secondary success and district graduation rate trends, which demonstrate improvement.

7. System stakeholders relevant to each part of the KESA process were **generally** involved during the accreditation cycle.

ARC Comment

Parents and focus groups expressed great satisfaction with how student progress was communicated and with staff availability. Surveys indicated that parents were satisfied with the progress of the school. Students interviewed noted how much they appreciated the opportunity to talk to teachers about their progress and to set learning goals.

8. System leadership was **generally** responsive to the Outside Visitation Team throughout the accreditation cycle.

ARC Comment

The team was welcomed in a professional and respective way. The district was cooperative in providing data and arranging interviews with stakeholders.

9. The system has generally followed the KESA process with an expected level of fidelity.

ARC Comment

As a school using the Cognia improvement process, the system has shown that they have followed the process with the expected level of fidelity. The school council had been informed of the accreditation process through Cognia. Surveys, reports, and data were reported to the council.

ARC Recommendation

The Accreditation Review Council recommended a status of **Accredited** for this system based on the following justification.

Justification

In the Cognia report, multiple sources of evidence supported both significant impact and improving areas in the accreditation process which will carry in the next cycle.

Strengths

The system establishes policies and supports practices that ensure effective administration of the school. Wellrespected and trusted administrators have developed a climate of mutual respect with internal and external stakeholders, creating a climate of trust in the school administration. This practice enhances system effectiveness and, in turn, positively impacts student performance.

Challenges

When examining documents, no code of ethics was available. This is a Cognia standard that is part of their accreditation process. When asked about a documented or written code of ethics, an administrator mentioned that the governing board did not have one, but does operate ethically. Because no code of ethics was available, longitudinal data providing evidence of the governing authority's ongoing adherence to the code of ethics over time was also lacking. When the governing authority members work under a written code of ethics that identifies principles of conduct and ethical standards within the institution, the operation of the school board improves. The governing authority is encouraged to develop and implement a formal written code of ethics.

Interviews revealed that times and formats for meetings seem to have a negative impact on reaching and involving diverse stakeholders. Parents shared that stakeholders from diverse groups did not seem to be as involved and engaged. Engaging and involving more diverse stakeholders to support the achievement of the system's purpose and direction will lead to even further success throughout the system. The system would benefit from identifying and implementing novel strategies to engage varied cultural groups comprising the school, celebrating their unique contributions. Targeted engagement, further meeting cultural needs and expectations, would enhance learning.

Continue progress with the IPS plan.







Percent at Levels 3 and 4







The entire evidentiary packet provided to the Professional Practices Commission is attached in subsequent pages.

On or about Sept. 24, 1995, Applicant was convicted with felony burglary and conspiracy to commit burglary in Case No. 96CR117. On July 7, 1997, Applicant was adjudicated as a juvenile offender for misdemeanor theft and two counts of misdemeanor unlawful use of financial card in Case No. 97JV94. On April 1, 2005, Applicant was placed on probation for five years for possession of marijuana while in possession of a firearm in the Circuit Court of Oktibbeha County, Mississippi in Case No. 2004-0207-CR. On March 24, 2009, Applicant completed probation. On Sept. 16, 2019, Applicant entered into a diversion agreement with the Garden City Municipal Court for misdemeanor possession of marijuana and misdemeanor drug paraphernalia. His diversion was completed Nov. 9, 2020. The PPC recommends the applicant receive an Emergency Substitute License.

COMES NOW, on this 25th day of July, 1995, the above captioned matter comes before the Honorable Gordan Goering, District Magistrate Judge, for adjudication. The State of Kansas appears by and through Scott M. Schultz, Assistant Finney County Attorney. The respondent appears in person by and through his court appointed attorney, Byron Anderson. Also appearing is the respondent's mother.

WHEREUPON, the counsel for the respondent informs the Court that they have reached an agreement whereby the respondent will change his plea and admit to Count One, Aggravated Battery, a level 5 person felony. In exchange for the admission the State will recommend two years supervised probation with restitution amounts and no contact with the victim.

WHEREUPON, the Court inquires of the respondent if this is his understanding of the agreement, to which he responds in the affirmative. The Court inquires of the respondent if he understands by entering into this agreement, he is giving up the right to a trial in this matter, the right to cross examine witnesses against him and certain appeal rights, to which the respondent answers in the affirmative. The respondent then provides a factual basis which in turn is accepted by the Court.

WHEREUPON, the Court after reviewing the Court file, hearing statements of counsel and being otherwise informed finds that the respondent makes said admissions, voluntarily, intelligently, with

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the advise of counsel and therefore, the Court finds the respondent to be a juvenile offender for violating K.S.A. 21-3414(a)(2)(A), Aggravated Battery, a severity level 5 person felony.

WHEREUPON, the parties agree to proceed to disposition. The Court then orders as follows:

- 1. The respondent shall be placed under the supervision of Court Services for a term of 24 months.
- 2. The respondent shall pay Court costs in the amount of \$16.50 and attorney fees in the amount of \$200.00, with said costs being paid through community service at the option of the respondent.
- 3. The respondent shall have no contact with Christopher Edwards, the victim of this case.
- 4. The respondent shall abide by all recommendations of his Court Services Officer.
- 5. The respondent shall pay restitution as per subsequent journal entry.

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



WHEREAS, a Complaint has been filed in the Municipal Court of the City of Garden City, Kansas (City), alleging that Defendant committed the following offense(s): Possession of Marijuana, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, and Exceeding Max Speed Limit 1-9 MPH Over.

WHEREAS, it appears to the City Prosecutor, after due and careful consideration of all the factors set forth in K.S.A. 12-4415 and all other relevant factors, that diversion of Defendant would be in the interest of justice and of benefit to Defendant and the community.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is stipulated and agreed as follows:

1. <u>Term.</u> The term of this Agreement shall be for a period of twelve (12) months from the date of the Agreement as specified above or until all conditions have been completed.

2. <u>Diversion Fee.</u> Defendant agrees to pay a diversion fee of Three Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$350.00) (minus \$35.00 application fee previously paid) prior to the execution of this Agreement.

3. <u>Fine/Court Costs/Donation/Attorney Fees.</u> Defendant agrees to pay a fine in the amount of Eight Hundred Forty Dollars (\$840.00), court costs of Ninety Dollars (\$90.00), KBI Lab Fee(G19-01328) of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00), and a Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) as a donation to Crime Stoppers of Garden City, for a total owed of One Thousand Three Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$1360.00). The fine, court costs, and donation shall be paid in ten (10) equal monthly installments of One Hundred Thirty-Six Dollars (\$136.00) commencing on October 31, 2019, and on or

before the same date each month thereafter until paid in full. Failure of Defendant to make timely payment of any installment set forth herein shall be grounds for revocation of this Agreement. Any and all payments of the above fines and court costs shall be made to the Municipal Court Clerk's Office at 304 N. 9th St., Garden City, Kansas.

4. <u>Special Terms.</u> Defendant agrees to the following special terms.

- a) Community Service: Defendant shall perform 20 hours of community service at the Lee Richardson Zoo. The defendant shall complete the <u>20</u> hours of community service in full by November 30, 2019 and shall provide proof of the same to the office of the City Prosecutor. Defendant shall not show up for work after having consumed alcoholic beverage and/or cereal malt beverage or while being under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drugs, nor shall Defendant consume alcoholic beverage and/or cereal malt beverage or any drugs while on the job. Violations of these rules shall also be a violation of the Diversion Agreement.
- b) Alcohol and Drug Evaluation: Defendant shall complete an alcohol and drug evaluation from City on a Hill and shall comply with all requirements therein within Six
 (6) months of the execution and signing of this agreement. This evaluation shall be obtained from City on a Hill located at 116 ½ East Chestnut, Garden City, KS 67846. Their telephone number is 620-276-0831. Failure to comply with this requirement shall be grounds for revocation of this Agreement and prosecution for the offense(s) charged.
- c) Urinalysis Testing: Defendant shall, at the request of the City Prosecutor's Office, obtain urinalysis testing and shall obtain the urinalysis test within 24 hours of the request. The tests shall be obtained at Community Corrections located at 607 W. Santa Fe.

Garden City, Kansas 67846 or at another provider selected by the Court and Defendant Coordinator. The Defendant is responsible for payment of any costs associated with the urinalysis testing. Failure to comply with this requirement shall be grounds for revocation of this Agreement and prosecution of the alleged offenses.

5. <u>Default</u>. Failure of Defendant to abide by or fulfill any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement shall be considered material noncompliance, a default, and a basis for revocation of this Agreement and initiation in Municipal Court of the proceedings on the complaint.

6. <u>Prior Participation/Conviction</u>. The parties stipulate that Defendant has not previously participated in a diversion program or been convicted of a felony.

7. <u>Waiver</u>. Defendant specifically waives all rights under the laws or Constitution of the United States and the State of Kansas, with respect to right to a speedy arraignment, speedy trial, and to a trial by jury. In addition, if Defendant is entering into this Agreement without the benefit or advice of counsel, Defendant acknowledges and agrees that Defendant has knowingly, intelligently, and voluntarily waived his/her right to counsel.

8. <u>Obey Laws.</u> Defendant agrees to obey all laws of the State of Kansas, City, and any and all other political subdivisions and entities of the United States. **Defendant agrees to notify the City Prosecutor and/or the Court and Defendant Coordinator within five (5) days of any new charges.** Violation of any law during the term of this Agreement shall be considered material noncompliance.

It is mutually understood and agreed that if Defendant satisfactorily completes all of the obligations of this Agreement, the City Prosecutor shall dismiss with prejudice the pending charges filed against Defendant after the successful completion of this Agreement. Successful completion of the Diversion Agreement may not be able to be verified until after the term of the Diversion Agreement expires.

10. <u>Presumption of Prosecution</u>. It is mutually understood and agreed that if it should come to the attention of the City Prosecutor, either at the termination of this Agreement, or at any time prior thereto, that Defendant has failed to fulfill the terms of this Agreement, the City Prosecutor shall inform the Municipal Court and, after a finding that Defendant has failed to fulfill the terms of this Agreement at a hearing thereon, the City Prosecutor shall resume the proceedings on the Complaint.

11. <u>Voluntary Agreement.</u> It is acknowledged by the parties that this Agreement has been explained to Defendant, and that Defendant is knowingly, intelligently, and voluntarily entering into this Agreement, after being fully advised of his/her Constitutional and Statutory rights.

12. Right to Terminate. The Municipal Court, Defendant, and the City Prosecutor, hereby reserve the right to terminate this Agreement at any time prior to the successful completion of the Agreement, and demand all pending charges covered by this Agreement be set immediately for trial. If this Agreement is terminated, for any reason, whether by the Municipal Court, Defendant, or the City Prosecutor, and if proceedings on the Complaint are resumed, Defendant understands and acknowledges that the proceedings, including any proceedings on appeal, shall be conducted on the

record of stipulations of facts relating to the Complaint. The parties understand and agree that during the term of this Agreement, the charges pending against Defendant shall remain in full force and effect.

13. <u>Supervision</u>. This Agreement shall be supervised by the Office of the City Prosecutor for the term of this Agreement and Defendant shall follow any and all directives of the Office of the City Prosecutor.

14. Notice of Change of Address. Whenever Defendant, after applying for or having been accepted for the Diversion Program, shall move from the mailing address or residential address named in this Diversion Agreement, Defendant, within 10 days thereafter, shall notify the Court and Defendant Coordinator and/or the Municipal Court in writing of his/her old and new mailing and residential addresses. The Court and Defendant Coordinator and/or the Municipal Court shall mail all notices to the Defendant's last known mailing address furnished to the Court and Defendant Coordinator and/or Municipal Court by Defendant if such address is different from Defendant's residential address.

15. <u>Non-admissible Evidence.</u> Defendant shall not be required to enter any plea to a criminal charge, offense or infraction, as a condition for diversion. No statements made by Defendant or counsel in any diversion conference or in any other discussion of a proposed diversion agreement shall be admissible as evidence in criminal proceedings on crimes, offenses, or infractions charged or facts alleged in a complaint.

16. <u>Expungement.</u> Pursuant to the provisions of K.S.A. 12-4516, if Defendant fulfills the terms of this Diversion Agreement, he may then petition the Municipal Court of the City of Garden City, Kansas for expungement of this Diversion Agreement and related arrest records.

17. <u>Notices.</u> All required official Court documents filed by the City Prosecutor's Office after the signing of this Diversion Agreement will be mailed directly to Defendant and his/her attorney, unless the attorney officially withdraws as counsel for Defendant.

18. <u>Stipulation of Facts.</u> If Defendant fails to fulfill the terms of this Agreement for any reason, or if Defendant terminates this agreement and proceedings on the Complaint are resumed, Defendant understands, acknowledges, and agrees that the proceedings, including any proceedings on appeal, shall be conducted on the record of stipulations of facts relating to the Complaint, as set forth below, and that Defendant will not be entitled to present additional evidence concerning guilt or innocence at that trial. This stipulation of facts is not an entry of a guilty plea. Defendant understands, acknowledges, and agrees that Defendant has the right under the Sixth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States and Section 10 of the Kansas Bill of Rights to conftont and cross-examine the witnesses that would testify against Defendant at trial and that Defendant is waiving such right by agreeing to trial on the record of stipulations of facts relating to the Complaint. Defendant acknowledges that the opportunity to review the stipulations of facts relating to the Complaint has been provided to Defendant.



It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education adopt the findings of fact and conclusion of law to suspend the Licensee in case 21-PPC-15 for the remainder of the contract year, 2021-2022.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

USD 512 filed a Complaint against Licensee alleging breach of an employment contract. By a vote of 5-0, the Professional Practices Commission finds the Licensee has breached her employment contract with the school district and recommends the professional teaching license of 21-PPC-15 be suspended for the remainder of the contract year, 2021-2022.

INITIAL ORDER

Decision

Having heard the testimony of the witnesses, considered the evidence presented, reviewed the applicable statutes, regulations and policies, and otherwise being duly and fully informed in the premises of this matter, the Professional Practices Commission (Commission) of the Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE) on a vote of 5 to 0 recommends to the Kansas State Board of Education (State Board) that the Complaint filed by Dr. Michael Schumacher (Dr. Schumacher), Associate Superintendent of Human Resources for the Shawnee Mission Unified School District No. 512 (School District), seeking to discipline the teaching license of the School District be affirmed, and teaching license be suspended for the remainder of the Contract year 2021-2022.

Statement of Case

This matter comes on for hearing before the Commission upon the Amended Complaint¹ filed by the School District on November 29, 2021 seeking discipline of Kansas professional teaching license due to an alleged breach of her employment contract with the School District.

The matter was presented to the Commission on January 21, 2022 for the Commission to consider if the matter should be dismissed according to the provisions of K.A.R. 91-22-7. The Commission was also to consider whether **according** had complied with the provisions of K.A.R. 91-22-9 requiring that an answer to the amended complaint be filed. Upon considering the pleadings submitted by the parties, the Commission concluded the matter a decision could be reached in the matter without the need for further hearing.

Appearing for the Commission were Chairperson, Jennifer Holt, and members Caroline Spaulding, Jamie Wetig, Aaron Edwards, and Charrica Osborne.

did not appear, although she did submit a response to the School District's briefing on the issues for the Commission to consider. Within the response **stated** she would "accept the [Commission]'s decision and do not wish to contest or for an evidentiary hearing to take place, as I do not feel legally prepared to argue SMSD's allegations."

The School District appeared by and through Rachel England, General Counsel.

Findings of Fact

1. is licensed to teach in the State of Kansas.

2. entered into a Professional Employee Contract (Contract) with the School District on December 8, 2020. (Complaint, Ex. A).² The term of the Contract was for the 2021-2022 school year. The Contract expressly included and incorporated the Articles of Agreement executed by the Board of Education of the School District and the National Education Association of Shawnee Mission (Agreement). (Complaint, Ex. C).

3. The Agreement contained the following late resignation provision in Article V(H)(3):

"Late Resignation. Professional Employees who desire to resign late, after the date designated in K.S.A. 77-2251, may resign under one of the following 3 options:

- a. Notice and Liquidated Damages. The Professional Employee must provide a minimum of 10 contract days' notice of resignation, counted from the first contract day after the resignation notice is tendered, and pay liquidated damages in the amount of \$2,000.00 to the District. Such Sum must be submitted by a personal check or a signed authorization for a payroll deduction on the date the resignation notice is tendered.
- b. Suitable Replacement. The Professional Employee must provide notice of resignation and allow the District 28 calendar days, counted from the day after the resignation notice is tendered, to find a suitable replacement for their position.
 - i. If the District is able to secure a suitable replacement within the 28day time period, then the Professional Employee's last day of employment would be the last contract day before the start of their replacement.

- ii. If the District is unable to secure a suitable replacement by the expiration of the 28-day time period, then the Professional Employee's last date of work would be on the last contract day within the 28-day time period and the Professional Employee may resign and leave their position without payment of liquidated damages.
- c. Proof of Qualifying Exception. The Professional Employee must provide notice as provided below and documented proof that they meet one of the following qualifying exceptions:
 - i. Move of a spouse for employment purposes to a residence more than 75 miles from the District's central office building. The Professional Employee must provide a minimum of 10 contract days' notice of resignation, counted from the first contract day after the resignation notice is tendered.
 - ii. Job promotion to an administrative position with a pre-K-12 school or school district. The Professional Employee would only be released from their contract effective the first contract day of the Fall semester, or effective the first contract day of the Spring semester. The Professional Employee must provide a minimum of 21 calendar days' notice of resignation, counted from the first day after the resignation is tendered.
 - iii. Mutual benefit of the District and the Professional Employee. The Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources may agree in writing to release a Professional Employee from their contract."

4. On September 3 and 4, 2021 sent emails to Dr. Schumacher notifying him that she was resigning from her position as a teacher for the School District. (Complaint, Ex. B). attached a letter of resignation.

5. On September 4, 2021 Dr. Schumacher responded to email and accompanying letter. (Complaint, Ex. B). Dr. Schumacher referenced the "Late Resignation" section of the Agreement that was incorporated into the Contract. Dr. Schumacher suggested that had two (2) options: work for ten (10) days and pay \$2,000 liquidated damages or work twenty-eight (28) days while the School District sought to find a suitable replacement.

6. On September 5, 2021 responded indicating that her last day would be September 7, 2021 and she was willing to pay the \$1,000 liquidated damages stated in the contract she had signed. (Complaint, Ex. B).

7. On September 6, Dr. Schumacher acknowledged the Contract had stated \$1,000; however, the terms of the Contract were subject to the Agreement that had been negotiated, and that pursuant to the terms of the Agreement, the liquidated damages had been increased to \$2,000, along with the ten (10) days' notice. (Complaint, Ex. B).

8. On September 6, 2021 responded to Dr. Schumacher's email. (Complaint, Ex. B). A solution of the environment "had an extreme effect on [her] mental health" and came to this decision in consultation with her doctor.

9. The last day reported to work for the School District was Friday, September 1, 2021.

10. The School District's Board of Education could not accept letter of resignation because she had not complied with the terms of her Contract, as modified by the Agreement. Because had abandoned her position with the School District and breached the Contract, the School District's Board of Education proceeded to terminate contract of employment.

11. On September 27, 2021 the School District's Board of Education adopted a resolution of intent to terminate contract of employment due to abandonment and failure to fulfill the terms of the Contract. (Complaint, Ex. D).

12. Notice of the School District's Board of Education resolution was provided to on September 28, 2021.

13. On October 11, 2021 the School District Board of Education adopted a resolution terminating contract of employment due to abandonment and failure to fulfill the Contract. (Complaint, Ex. E). A copy of the resolution was provided to contract of October 13, 2021.

14. This matter came before the Commission due to the Complaint filed on behalf of the School District on October 18, 2021.

15. An Amended Complaint was filed on behalf of the School District on November 29, 2021.

16. did not file an answer to the Complaint within the twenty (20) days set forth in K.A.R. 91-22-9(a).

17. During a prehearing conference conducted on December 28, 2021, the parties were instructed to file briefs concerning the applicability of the provisions of K.A.R. 91-22-7 which requires a complaint be dismissed if the employment contract contains a liquidated damages clause. The parties were also instructed to brief the issue of failure to answer the complaint as provided by K.A.R. 91-22-9(a).

18. The School District filed its brief on January 10, 2022.

19. filed a response to the School District's brief on January 19, 2022.

20. The School District filed an unsolicited reply brief on January 21, 2022.

Conclusions of Law

1. The State Board is responsible for the general supervision of education, including the certification and licensure of teachers, in Kansas.³

2. A complaint seeking discipline against State of Kansas teaching license was filed by the District in compliance with K.A.R. 91-22-5a.

3. "Any license issued by the state board **may** be suspended or revoked, or the license holder may be publicly censured by the state board for misconduct or other just cause."⁴

4. Regulation allows for suspension or revocation of a teacher's license for "breach of an employment contract with an education agency by abandonment of the position."⁵

5. "All contracts shall be binding on both the teacher and board of education of the school district until the teacher has been legally discharged from such teacher's teaching position or until released by the board of education from such contract. Until such teacher has been discharged or released, such teacher shall not have authority to enter into a contract with the board of education of any school district for any period of time covered in the original contract. If upon written complaint, signed by $\frac{2}{3}$ of the members of the board of education of the school district, any teacher who is reported to have entered into a contract with another school or board of education without having been released from such former contract, or for other reasons fails to fulfill the provisions of such contract, such teacher, upon being found guilty of such charge at a hearing held before the state board of education, shall have such teacher's license suspended for the remainder of the term for which such contract was made."

6. "(a) The commission, on its own motion, or a member of the teaching or school administration profession may initiate proceedings before the commission by filing a complaint in writing alleging that a license holder or applicant has engaged in any conduct for which a license issued by the state board may be denied, suspended, or revoked under K.A.R. 91-22-1a and amendments thereto. The complaint shall be filed with the commission's secretary."⁷

7. "A complaint filed directly with the state board pursuant to K.S.A. 72-1383 or K.S.A. 72-5412, and amendments thereto, alleging that a license holder is in breach of the license holder's employment contract with a local board shall be referred to the commission for investigation, hearing, and the entry of an initial order regarding licensure. If the investigation reveals a settlement provision or liquidated damages clause in local board policy or in the contract of the employee, so that the employee could make a financial settlement to a local district governing authority or be relieved of contractual commitment by other agreed means, the case shall be dismissed by the commission."⁸

8. As has been previously identified by the State Board, there is a conflict that exists between the statute and the regulation governing these matters. The statute requires suspension of a teacher's license for failing to fulfill the terms of a legally binding contract. There is no consideration given to the existence, or not, of a liquidated damage clause within the contract. Whereas, the regulation requires dismissal of the complaint if there exists a liquidated damages clause within the contract.

9. Pursuant to the Agreement, had the Board of Education of the School District accepted letter of resignation, would have been contractually obligated to give ten (10) days' notice and pay liquidated damages in the amount of \$2,000. Contract elected not to provide ten (10) days' notice, having not returned to the School District after her last day of work on September 3, 2021, the same day she submitted her letter of resignation. Nor did pay the \$2,000 in liquidated damages.

10. Dr. Schumacher allowed the opportunity to indicate which of the two (2) provisions in the Agreement she was going to accept, either ten (10) days' notice with liquidated damages or twenty-eight (28) days' notice with no liquidated damages. If elected neither, indicating she was not going to provide any notice. This was in direct breach of the contract. By refusing to accept either provision, indicated damage did not elect to pursue the opportunity for financial settlement, but rather blatantly indicated her desire to breach the contract.

11. Based upon abandonment of her position of employment and failure to return to work, the Board of Education of the School District exercised its discretion and rejected resignation letter and issued a notice of intent to terminate. Having received no further information from **Constant**, the Board of Education for the School District terminated **Constant** for abandonment of her employment and breach of contract.

12. was warned of the potential implications of her failure to comply with the terms of the Contract. Chose to abandon her teaching position with the School District, in breach of her contract.

13. As to the issue of **and the** failure to answer the Amended Complaint within the required twenty (20) days, the Commission accepted **and the** response to the School District's brief as a late answer, even though made no request that the Commission do so. In so doing, the Commission noted that **and the acknowledged** the allegations made against her and indicated she did not want to contest the Commission's decision as to any proposed suspension.

14. On a vote of five (5) in favor and zero (0) opposed, the Commission recommends to the State Board that the Complaint filed by Dr. Michael Schumacher, Associate Superintendent of Human Resources for the Shawnee Mission Unified School District No. 512, seeking to discipline the professional teaching license of the remainder of the Contract year, 2021-2022.

Act on the recommendations of the Processional Practices Commission (revocation and denial)

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education denies or revokes the licenses in the cases of 21-PPC-18, 21-PPC-21, 21-PPC-22, 21-PPC-23, 21-PPC-24, 21-PPC-27, 21-PPC-29 and 21-PPC-30.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

21-PPC-18

While licensed by the Kansas State Board of Education, the Licensee was found guilty of misdemeanor sexual battery in the District Court of Cloud County, Kansas. Rather than engage in the hearing process of the Professional Practices Commission, the Licensee submitted a voluntary surrender. By vote of 7-0, the PPC recommends accepting Licensee's surrender and revoking 21-PPC-18's license.

21-PPC-21

Licensee holds a professional teaching license issued by the Kansas State Board of Education. Licensee has been licensed since 2011. On or about May 3rd, 2021, Licensee was convicted in Clay County District Court, Case 21-CR-22, of Hosting Minors in Consumption of Alcoholic Beverage, a class A misdemeanor as described in K.S.A. 21-5608. On that same date, Licensee was convicted of Furnishing Alcoholic Liquor to a Minor, a class B misdemeanor as described in K.S.A. 21-5607(a). Both convictions stem from allegations of misconduct involving minor children. A complaint was filed and mailed to the Licensee but she filed neither a request for hearing or an answer. By vote of 7-0, the PPC recommends revocation of 21-PPC-21's license.

21-PPC-22

Applicant applied for an Emergency Substitute Teaching License to be issued by the Kansas State Board of Education. Applicant has been convicted of five felonies within the last five years of criminal damage to property. A complaint was filed and mailed to the Applicant but she filed neither a request for hearing or an answer. By vote of 7-0, the PPC recommends denial of 21-PPC-22's application.

21-PPC-23

Applicant applied for an Emergency Substitute Teaching License. Applicant was previously licensed by the Kansas State Board of Education from June 25, 1998 to March 8, 2011. On August 13, 2010, (continued) Applicant entered a plea of guilty to, and was convicted of, three counts of Unlawful Sexual Relations with a student, in violation of K.S.A. 21-3520(a)(8), severity 10, person felonies. A complaint was filed and mailed to the Applicant but she filed neither a request for hearing or an answer. Applicant's license was revoked by the Kansas State Board of Education following a hearing of the Professional Practices Commission that was held on January 31, 2011. On the pending application, Applicant indicated she had never previously been convicted of a felony. Applicant also indicated she had never had a teacher's certificate or licensure revoked. On December 13, 2021, a complaint was filed and mailed to the Applicant but she filed neither a request for hearing or an answer. By a vote of 7-0, the PPC recommends denial of 21-PPC-23's application.

21-PPC-24

Licensee holds a professional teaching license issued by the Kansas State Board of Education. Licensee has been licensed since 2007. On or about January 2, 2020, Licensee was convicted in the District Court of Johnson County for misdemeanor possession of marijuana and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia in case #20CR02974. On May 25, 2021, Licensee was sentenced to probation for twelve months. Licensee was licensed at the time of the offense. A complaint was filed and mailed to the Licensee but he filed neither a request for hearing or an answer. By a vote of 7-0, the PPC recommends revocation of 21-PPC-24's license.

21-PPC-27

Licensee holds a professional teaching license issued by the Kansas State Board of Education. Licensee has been licensed since 2000. On or about September 3, 2020, Licensee was convicted and sentenced of Felony Stalking as defined in K.S.A. 21-5427 in Johnson County District Court Case 20DV425. A complaint was filed and mailed to the Licensee but she filed neither a request for hearing or an answer. By a vote of 5-0, the PPC recommends revocation of 21-PPC-27's license.

21-PPC-29

Licensee holds a professional teaching license issued by the Kansas State Board of Education. Licensee has been licensed since 2000. On or about the 22nd day of September 2020, Licensee entered into a diversion agreement in the Bourbon County District Court, case 2020-CR-000437, after having been charged with felony Possession of Methamphetamine as described in K.S.A 65-4107(d)(3) in violation of 21-5706(a)(c)(1), and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia as described in 21-5709(b)(2)(e)(3). A complaint was filed and mailed to the Licensee but she filed neither a request for hearing or an answer. By a vote of 5-0, the PPC recommends revocation of 21-PPC-29's license.

21-PPC-30

Licensee holds a professional teaching license issued by the Kansas State Board of Education. Licensee has been licensed since 2018. On December 8, 2021, Licensee pled guilty to felony Attempted Electronic Solicitation of a Child in Leavenworth County District Court case 2020-CR-000542, as described in K.S.A. 21-55509(a)(1). The date of the offense was on or about the 21st day (continued)

of November, 2020. Licensee was licensed at the time of the offense. A complaint was filed and mailed to the Licensee but he filed neither a request for hearing or an answer. By a vote of 5-0, the PPC recommends revocation of 21-PPC-30's license.

- Licensee voluntary surrendered¹ his teaching license for revocation as a consequence of his
 misconduct and having been found guilty of misdemeanor sexual battery in the District Court of
 Cloud County, Kansas.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 1. A member of the teaching or school administration profession may voluntarily surrender his license to the Commission. The Commission shall investigate the surrender and make a recommendation to the Kansas State Board of Education (State Board) for disposition of the license. K.A.R. 91-22-5a(e).
- 2. Under these circumstances, notice of the possible revocation of Licensee's license and the opportunity for him to have a hearing are not required to revoke his license. See K.A.R. 91-22-1a(h). (Before a license is revoked for any act described in K.A.R. 91-22-1a(a), the person shall be given notice and an opportunity for a hearing).
- 3. The State Board may revoke a license for misconduct or other just cause including the commission or omission of any act that injures the health or welfare of a minor through physical or sexual abuse or exploitation. K.A.R. 91-22-1a(7).

- 2. On or about May 3, 2021, Licensee was convicted in Clay County District Court, Case 21-CR-22, of Hosting Minors in Consumption of Alcoholic Beverage, a class A misdemeanor as described in K.S.A. 21-5608. On that same date, Licensee was convicted of Furnishing Alcoholic Liquor to a Minor, a class B misdemeanor as described in K.S.A. 21-5607(a). Both convictions stem from allegations of misconduct involving minor children.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- The Kansas State Board of Education (State Board) is responsible for the general supervision of Kansas education, including the certification and licensure of teachers. Kan. Const., Art. VI and K.S.A. 72-255.
- The State Board may revoke a license for misconduct or other just cause. The State Board may revoke a licensee for conviction of any misdemeanor involving a minor as K.A.R. 91-22-1a(a) and (a)(2).

INITIAL ORDER

The above-captioned case comes on for hearing before the Professional Practices Commissioner ("Commission") of the Kansas State Board of Education (State Board) upon the Complaint filed by the Kansas State Department of Education ("KSDE") seeking revocation of

[Licensee] professional teaching license.

The hearing on this matter was held on March 4, 2022. Appearing for the Commission were chairperson, Jennifer Holt, and members, Aaron Edwards, Eric Filippi, Carey Spaulding, and Christy Ziegler. The KSDE appeared by and through its attorney, General Counsel, R. Scott Gordon. Licensee did not appear.

FINDINGS OF FACT

- Licensee holds a professional teaching license issued by the Kansas State Board of Education. Licensee has been licensed since 2018.
- On December 8, 2021, Licensee pled guilty to felony Attempted Electronic Solicitation of a Child in Leavenworth County District Court case 2020-CR-000542, as described in K.S.A. 21-55509(a)(1). The date of the offense was on or about the 21st day of November, 2020. Licensee was licensed at the time of the offense.
- The Complaint was mailed to Applicant's last known address by standard and by certified mail. The certified mail receipt indicates it was delivered and signed for. Applicant did not submit either a request for hearing or an Answer.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- The Kansas State Board of Education (State Board) is responsible for the general supervision of Kansas education, including the certification and licensure of teachers. Kan. Const., Art. VI and K.S.A. 72-255.
- The State Board may revoke a license for misconduct or other just cause. K.A.R. 91-22-1a. The State Board may revoke a licensee for conviction of any crime punishable as a felony. K.A.R. 91-22-1a(a)(1). The State Board may revoke a license for conviction of any crime involving a minor. K.A.R. 91-22-1a(a)(2).

- One of the obvious goals of education is to "instill respect for the law." <u>Hainline v. Bond</u>, 250 Kan. 217 (1992). An educator is a role model. <u>Hainline</u> at 224.
- 4. Teaching and school administration are professions with all the similar rights, responsibilities and privileges accorded other legally recognized professions. K.S.A. 72-2308.
- 5. Licensee's conduct is inconsistent with the commonly-held perceptions and expectations of a member of the teaching profession. Such conduct violates the public trust and confidence placed in members of the profession. Licensee's conduct demonstrates a lack of fitness to perform the duties and responsibilities of a member of the teaching and school administration professions and is sufficient and just cause to revoke license.
- 6. If a party fails to participate in the adjudicative process, the party may be found to have conceded to the outcome requested by the filed complaint.

THEREFORE the Professional Practices Commission recommends to the State Board, by a vote of **5-0**, that the professional teaching license of the Licensee be revoked based conviction of felony Attempted Electronic Solicitation of a Child, the underlying misconduct which resulted in the conviction, and for failure to participate in the administrative proceedings.

Item Title:

Act on revised recommendation of the Evaluation Review Committee for higher education new program approval for Ottawa University

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education accept the following recommendation of the Evaluation Review Committee for "New Program Approval" for Ottawa University.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

Following the institutional application and receipt of a complete institutional report, a review team of trained evaluators was appointed to review the proposed new teacher education program for Ottawa University based on adopted State Board policies, procedures and regulations. These are available for review by any member or members of the State Board. The review team's report and institution's response to the report, along with the institutional report, were submitted to the Evaluation Review Committee (ERC) of the Teaching and School Administration Professional Standards Advisory Board in November 2021. The ERC, in accordance with procedures adopted by the State Board, prepared recommendations regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the proposed new teacher education program, which were submitted to the State Board in January 2022.

At its Jan. 11, 2022 meeting, the State Board of Education postponed action on the ERC's recommendation for Ottawa University's proposed new School Counselor program, expressing concern over Not Met School Counselor Standards 1 and 4. The Board requested that the Not Met standards be further addressed.

The university was asked to address the Areas for Improvement associated with the Not Met standards. Revised program materials and explanations of the proposed program's alignment to the School Counselor standards were provided to the ERC at an ad hoc meeting of the committee held March 1, 2022. The ERC revised its recommendations for the proposed program based on the revised program design and revised description of program alignment to School Counselor program standards.

A copy of the regulations covering this process is also attached. Staff will be on hand to answer any questions.

Introductory Statement:

On March 1, 2022, the Evaluation Review Committee reviewed revisions of an application and additional materials for a new program approval for Ottawa University.

Documents that were received and considered include revised program materials and a revised program alignment to the School Counselor program standards.

PROGRAM APPROVAL RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommend "New Program Approved with Stipulation" status for the following program through December 31, 2023:

School Counselor, A, PreK-12, New Areas for Improvement: Standards 1-3, 5-6, 8 None

Standard 4 (Met)

AFI 4.1: The coverage of individual counseling remains unclear.

Revised Rationale 4.1: It is unclear how mastery of individual and group counseling elements are met in Assessment 5d EDC 7933 Group Counseling & Dynamics.

- AFI 4.2: It is not clear how Assessment 5e EDC 7303 course content, goals and objectives, and key activities align to Standard 4.
- **Revised Rationale 4.2:** Course description and goals stated in the supplemental response addresses dynamics but does not explicitly include theory of individual and group counseling.

Standard 7 (Met)

AFI 7.1: Alignment of Assessment 7 to the standard is not clear.

Rationale 7.1: Further clarification of the relationship between the Danielson framework and the standard would be helpful.

New programs may be approved-with-stipulation for 2 years during which they are operationalized, which is to be reported to KSDE. A progress report is due 60 days after the second semester of operation to address the new program stipulation.

PROGRAM REVIEW PROCESS

The responsibilities of the Commissioner and State Board regarding unit accreditation under regulations 91-1-231(d), 91-1-232b and 91-1-70a are as follows:

KSDE's Evaluation Review Committee (ERC) renders program approval recommendations for the initial teacher preparation and advanced program levels of the unit.

PROGRAM DECISIONS

New program approval decisions are:

- New Program Approved with Stipulation
- Not Approved.

Renewal program decisions are:

- Approved
- Approved with Stipulation
- Not Approved.

The responsibilities of the Commissioner and State Board regarding program approval are under regulations 91-1-235 and 91-1-236.

91-1-235. Procedures for initial approval of teacher education programs.

(a) Application.

(1) Each teacher education institution that desires to have any new program approved by the state board shall submit an application for program approval to the commissioner. The application shall be submitted at least 12 months before the date of implementation.

(2) Each institution shall submit with its application a program report containing a detailed description of each proposed program, including program coursework based on standards approved by the state board, and the performance-based assessment system that will be utilized to collect performance data on candidates' knowledge and skills. Each program report shall be in the form and shall contain the information prescribed by the commissioner. The program report shall include confirmation that the candidates in the program will be required to complete the following successfully:

(A) Coursework that constitutes a major in the subject at the institution or that is equivalent to a major;(B) at least 12 weeks of student teaching; and

(C) a validated preservice candidate work sample.

(b) Review team. Upon receipt of a program report, a review team shall be appointed by the commissioner to analyze the program report. The chairperson of the review team shall be designated by the commissioner. The number of review team members shall be determined by the commissioner, based upon the scope of the program to be reviewed. Any institution may challenge the appointment of a review team member. The institution's challenge shall be submitted in writing and received by the commissioner no later than 30 days after the notification of review team appointments is sent to the institution. Each challenge to the appointment of a review team member shall be only on the basis of a conflict of interest.

(c) Program review process.

(1) In accordance with procedures adopted by the state board, a review team shall examine and analyze the proposed program report and shall prepare a report expressing the findings and conclusions of the review team. The review team's report shall be submitted to the commissioner. The report shall be forwarded by the commissioner to an appropriate representative designated by the teacher education institution.

(2) Any institution may prepare a response to the review team's report. This response shall be prepared and submitted to the commissioner no later than 45 days of receipt of the review team's report. Receipt of the review team's report shall be presumed to occur three days after mailing. The review team's report, any response by the institution, and any other supporting documentation shall be forwarded to the evaluation review committee by the commissioner.

(d) Initial recommendation. The evaluation review committee, in accordance with procedures adopted by the state board, shall prepare a written initial recommendation regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the proposed program, which shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative designated by the teacher education institution and to the commissioner.
 (e) Request for hearing.

(1) Within 30 days of receipt of an initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee, the teacher education institution may submit a written request by certified mail to the evaluation review committee for a hearing before the committee to appeal the initial recommendation. Receipt of the initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee shall be presumed to occur three days after mailing. This request shall specify, in detail, the basis for the appeal, including an identification of each item disputed by the institution.

(2) If a request for a hearing is submitted, the evaluation review committee shall conduct a hearing. The committee shall then prepare a written final recommendation regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the proposed program, which shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The final recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative designated by the teacher education institution and to the commissioner. The final recommendation shall be submitted for its consideration and determination.

(3) If a request for a hearing is not submitted by certified mail within the time allowed under paragraph(e) (1), the initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee shall become the final recommendation of the review committee. The committee's final recommendation shall be submitted by the commissioner to the state board for its consideration and determination.

(f) Approval status. Each new program shall be approved with stipulation or not approved. (g) Annual report.

(1) If a new program is approved with stipulation, the institution shall submit a progress report to the commissioner within 60 days after completion of the second semester of operation of the program and thereafter in each of the institution's annual reports that are due on or before July 30.

(2) Each progress report shall be submitted by the commissioner to the evaluation review committee for its examination and analysis. Following review of the progress report, the evaluation review committee may remove any areas for improvement and change the status to approved until the institution's next program review.

(h) Change of approval status.

(1) At any time, the approval status of a teacher education program may be changed by the state board if, after providing an opportunity for a hearing, the state board finds that the institution either has failed to meet substantially the program standards or has materially changed the program. For just cause, the duration of the approval status of a program may be extended by the state board. The duration of the

current approval status of a program shall be extended automatically if the program is in the process of being reevaluated by the state board. This extension shall be counted as part of any subsequent approval period of a program.

(2) At the time of an institution's next on-site visit, the new program shall be reviewed pursuant to K.A.R. 91-1-236.

(3) For licensure purposes, each teacher education program that is approved with stipulation shall be considered to be approved. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Aug. 6, 2004; amended Aug. 12, 2011; amended July 7, 2017.)

91-1-236. Procedures for renewing approval of teacher education program.

(a) Application for program renewal.

(1) Each teacher education institution that desires to have the state board renew the approval status of one or more of its teacher education programs shall submit to the commissioner an application for program renewal. The application shall be submitted at least 12 months before the expiration of the current approval period of the program or programs.

(2) Each institution shall also submit a program report, which shall be in the form and shall contain the information prescribed by the commissioner. The program report shall be submitted at least six months before the expiration of the current approval period of the program or programs. The program report shall include confirmation that the candidates in the program will be required to complete the following:

(A) Coursework that constitutes a major in the subject at the institution or that is equivalent to a major; and

(B) at least 12 weeks of student teaching.

(b) Review team. Upon receipt of a complete program report, a review team shall be appointed by the commissioner to analyze the program report. The chairperson of the review team shall be designated by the commissioner. The number of review team members shall be determined by the commissioner, based upon the scope of the program or programs to be reviewed. An institution may challenge the appointment of a review team member only on the basis of a conflict of interest.

(c) Program review process.

 In accordance with procedures adopted by the state board, each review team shall examine and analyze the program report and prepare a review report expressing the findings and conclusions of the review team. The review team's report shall be submitted to the commissioner. The report shall be forwarded by the commissioner to an appropriate representative of the teacher education institution.
 Any institution may prepare a written response to the review team's report. Each response shall be prepared and submitted to the commissioner within 45 days of receipt of the review team's report. The review team's report, any response filed by the institution, and any other supporting documentation shall be forwarded by the commissioner to the evaluation review committee.

 (d) Initial recommendation. The evaluation review committee, in accordance with procedures adopted by the state board, shall prepare a written initial recommendation regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the program or programs, which shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative of the teacher education institution and to the commissioner.
 (e) Request for hearing.

(1) Within 30 days of the receipt of an initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee, the teacher education institution may submit a written request to the commissioner for a hearing before the evaluation review committee to appeal the initial recommendation of the committee. This request shall

specify, in detail, the basis for the appeal, including an identification of each item disputed by the institution.

(2) If a request for a hearing is submitted, the evaluation review committee shall conduct a hearing. The committee shall then prepare a written final recommendation regarding the appropriate status to be assigned to the program or programs, which shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The final recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative of the teacher education institution and to the commissioner. The final recommendation shall be submitted by the commissioner to the state board for its consideration and determination of program approval status according to paragraph (f)(1).

(3) If a request for a hearing is not submitted within the time allowed under paragraph (1) of this subsection, the initial recommendation of the evaluation review committee shall become the final recommendation of the review committee. The committee's final recommendation shall be submitted by the commissioner to the state board for its consideration and determination.
 (f) Approval status.

(1) The status assigned to any teacher education program specified in this regulation shall be approved, approved with stipulation, or not approved.

(2) Subject to subsequent action by the state board, the assignment of approved status to a teacher education program shall be effective for seven academic years. However, the state board, at any time, may change the approval status of a program if, after providing an opportunity for a hearing, the state board finds that the institution either has failed to meet substantially the program standards adopted by the state board or has made a material change in a program. For just cause, the duration of the approval status of a program may be extended by the state board. The duration of the approval status of a program shall be extended automatically if the program is in the process of being reevaluated by the state board.

(3) (A) If a program is approved with stipulation, that status shall be effective for the period of time specified by the state board, which shall not exceed seven years.

(B) If any program of a teacher education institution is approved with stipulation, the institution shall include in an upgrade report to the commissioner the steps that the institution has taken and the progress that the institution has made during the previous academic year to address the deficiencies that were identified in the initial program review.

(C) The upgrade report shall be submitted by the commissioner to the evaluation review committee for its examination and analysis. After this examination and analysis, the evaluation review committee shall prepare a written recommendation regarding the status to be assigned to the teacher education program for the succeeding academic years. The recommendation shall include a statement of the findings and conclusions of the evaluation review committee. The recommendation shall be submitted to an appropriate representative of the teacher education institution and to the commissioner. If the institution does not agree with this recommendation, the institution may request a hearing according to the provisions in subsection (e).

(D) For licensure purposes, each teacher education program that is approved with stipulation shall be considered to be approved.

(4) Students shall be allowed two full, consecutive, regular semesters following the notification of final action by the state board to complete a program that is not approved. Summers and interterms shall not be counted as part of the two regular semesters. Students who finish within these two regular semesters may be recommended for licensure by the college or university. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Aug. 6, 2004; amended Aug. 12, 2011.)

Act on recommendations for funding Kansas Preschool Pilot grants for 2022-2023

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education approve grant awards for the Kansas Preschool Pilot for 2022-2023, subject to legislative approval of funding. If a program is unable to spend funds awarded, the Kansas State Department of Education is authorized to reallocate funding among programs in an amount not to exceed \$8,332,317.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

Kansas established the Kansas Preschool Pilot in 2006. This program funds projects that provide high-quality education for preschool-aged children. Allocated funding has increased from \$2 million dollars in 2006-07 to \$8,332,317 by 2018-19. Two funding sources support this Kansas Preschool Pilot. Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) is federal funding. State tobacco master settlement agreement revenue supports the Children's Initiatives Fund (CIF).

Other sources of funding are larger, more sustainable options for districts to invest in preschool. These include federal Head Start grants, state school finance formula funds (state enrollment aid and accompanying weightings for preschool students with disabilities and three-and four-year-old preschool-aged at-risk students) and special education funds. Grant applicants were required to forecast the amount of revenue that they would receive from other sources of funding in 2022-2023 and demonstrate that they were reinvesting those other funding sources into their preschool programs before requesting grant funding to supplement gaps.

KSDE collaborated with the Kansas Children's Cabinet and Trust Fund to align program requirements and application processes between the Kansas Preschool Pilot and the Early Childhood Block Grant program, which is administered by the Children's Cabinet. This allowed programs to submit just one application to apply for both sources of funding, rather than submitting two separate grant applications. A team of reviewers scored applications using a rubric. KSDE and Children's Cabinet staff then rank-ordered proposals by score and collaboratively developed funding recommendations.

The amount of grant funding requested exceeds anticipated funding available. In 2022, 132 entities requested \$35,654,509 in funding for the 2022-2023 school year. The Early Childhood Block Grant

anticipates \$19,784,000 total funds available, leaving \$15,870,509 in requested funds. KSDE does not anticipate an increase in the Kansas Preschool Pilot funding available in 2022-2023 (\$8,332,317).

The COVID-19 pandemic created significant disruptions for young children and their families, as documented by the All In For Kansas Kids Needs Assessment 2020 Update. KSDE anticipates that approximately \$2,500,000 of Governor's Emergency Education Relief (GEER) funding will be available to fund additional Kansas Preschool Pilot grant awards.

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education authorize the Commissioner of Education to negotiate and enter into a contract with America's Service Commissions for the purpose of recruiting an Encore Fellow to support Commission outreach activities, with said contract to be from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023, in an amount not to exceed \$35,250 out of federal funds.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

The Kansas Volunteer Commission desires to expand outreach of its services and grant opportunities across the state, but lacks the staff capacity to make all the necessary connections with local communities. Through a partnership with America's Service Commissions (ASC), an organization representing and promoting state service commissions across the United States, the Commission will receive an Encore Fellow to assist with outreach and promotion of available resources. The Encore Fellowship is a one-year, paid opportunity for experienced, skilled professionals interested in transitioning to a second act in the social sector. These individuals serve 1,000 hours remotely in a host site organization.

The opt-in fee will enable the Commission to partner with ASC for a one-year Encore Fellowship. ASC will submit the application for a Fellow to Encore and will handle all of the HR and administrative tasks needed. They will also provide any necessary technology and equipment.

The Commission will provide supervision and meaningful work for the Fellow, to include the outreach opportunities highlighted above.

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education authorize the Commissioner of Education to negotiate and enter into a contract with Tidemark Institute, LLC, in an amount not to exceed \$23,550 to provide professional development to Kansas science educators for the period June 23 to July 11, 2022.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

Leaders within the Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE) want to ensure that administrators and educators throughout the state have the ongoing support they need to effectively implement the Kansas State Science Standards to help accelerate learning for their students. Research proves that Renaissance solutions have the greatest effect on student achievement when they are implemented with quality and fidelity. Professional development services are designed to teach educators new strategies and skills, help them apply what they learn in their classrooms, and monitor outcomes to drive continuous improvement.

Tidemark Institute, LLC, (NGSX) was founded by members of the National Framework for Science Education and Next Generation Science Standards writing team. The organization offers a blended learning approach to implementing / facilitating three-dimensional teaching and learning. This training will provide a systems level view for 30 Kansas educators to engage in curriculum agnostic, practice-based professional learning and will allow teachers across the state to engage in discourse around common science instructional practices.

The KSDE program manager will work with Tidemark Institute to select up to 40 participants who represent diverse districts and grade levels around the state. Additionally, 10 of the participants (including the KSDE program manager) will receive additional training to become a facilitator of this model. The intent is that through training trainers, this program will be sustainable for Kansas Science educators for years to come.

Act on a request to contract with the University of Kansas Medical Center to assist with administration of the 2023 Youth Risk Behavior Survey in selected Kansas high schools

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education authorize the Commissioner of Education to negotiate and enter into a contract with the University of Kansas Medical Center to work with KSDE in administering the 2023 Youth Risk Behavior Survey in selected Kansas schools. The contract would be in an amount not to exceed \$10,000 for the period Dec. 1, 2022 to May 31, 2023.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

KSDE Career Standards and Assessment Services administers a grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to conduct the 2023 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) in selected Kansas high schools. The information gathered through the YRBS is critical to understanding student health behaviors and to identify trends in youth behavior. Contracting with the University of Kansas to help administer the 2017, 2019 and 2021 YRBS was critical to achieving weighted data for those years.

By contracting again with the University of Kansas, more people and resources will be available to administer the 2023 Youth Risk Behavior Survey. More technical assistance and follow-up will be offered, which will increase participation rates of schools. In accordance with the Kansas Student Data Privacy Act, active consent will be sought for students to participate in the completion of the survey. The goal is to have data on student health behavior that can be used by KSDE and other student health advocates to understand rates of incidence and trends that will be helpful in developing education and programming to improve student health in Kansas.

Act on revised request from USD 258 Humboldt, Allen County, to hold a bond election

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education issue an Order authorizing USD 258 Humboldt, Allen County, to hold an election on the question of issuing bonds in excess of the district's general bond debt limitation. Subsequent to the State Board approving the original application, the Board of Education of USD 258 has filed a new application seeking permission to call and hold an election with the issuance of bonds in the lower dollar amount \$17,450,000 instead of the amount originally approved on Feb. 8, 2022.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

Under KSA 72-5461 et seq., a school district may request that the State Board of Education authorize the district to hold an election on the question of issuing bonds in an amount which would cause the district's bonded indebtedness to exceed the district's general bond debt limitation. USD 258, Humboldt, Allen County, has made such a request. If approved, the district could hold an election on the question of whether additional bonds be issued. If the voters approve such action, the district could issue the bonds.

Recommended Motion:

It is moved that the Kansas State Board of Education issue an Order authorizing USD 258 Humboldt, Allen County, to receive capital improvement (bond and interest) state aid as authorized by law. Subsequent to the State Board approving the original application, the Board of Education of USD 258 has filed a new application seeking permission to call and hold an election with the issuance of bonds in the lower dollar amount \$17,450,000 instead of the amount originally approved on Feb. 8, 2022.

Explanation of Situation Requiring Action:

Under KSA 72-5461 et seq., a school district may request that the State Board of Education authorize the district to receive capital improvement (bond and interest) state aid. USD 258 Humboldt, Allen County, has made such a request. If approved, the district would receive capital improvement (bond and interest) state aid to be prorated at 100 percent as provided by law. If the request is not approved, the district will not receive any capital improvement state aid. The bond hearing for state aid was held on Jan. 28, 2022.

SBR 91-31-42 allows any school district to request a waiver from one or more of their accreditation requirements imposed by the State Board. Requests by schools to waive school accreditation regulation SBR 91-31-34 (appropriate certification/licensure of staff) are reviewed by the staff of Teacher Licensure and Accreditation. The district(s) must submit an application verifying that the individual teacher for whom they are requesting the waiver is currently working toward achieving the appropriate endorsement on his/her license. A review of the waiver application is completed before the waiver is recommended for approval.

The requests below have been reviewed by the Teacher Licensure and Accreditation staff and are being forwarded to the State Board of Education for action. If approved, school districts will be able to use the individuals in an area outside the endorsement on their license, and in the area for which they have submitted an approved plan of study. The waiver is valid for one school year.
