## Background

SPP/APR Indicator 3B measures the participation and performance of children with an individualized education program (IEP) on state-wide assessments.

The <u>2025 Part-B SPP/APR Measurement Table — New Format</u> (PDF) describes SPP/APR Indicator 3B as the:

Proficiency rate percent = [(# of children with IEPs scoring at or above proficient against grade level academic achievement standards) divided by the (total # of children with IEPs who received a valid score and for whom a proficiency level was assigned for the regular assessment)]. Calculate separately for reading and math. Calculate separately for grades 4, 8, and high school. The proficiency rate includes both children with IEPs enrolled for a full academic year and those not enrolled for a full academic year.

The <u>2025 Part-B SPP/APR Measurement Table — New Format</u> (PDF) describes SPP/APR Indicator 3D as the:

Proficiency rate gap = [(proficiency rate for children with IEPs scoring at or above proficient against grade level academic achievement standards for the 2024-2025 school year) subtracted from the (proficiency rate for all students scoring at or above proficient against

grade level academic achievement standards for the 2024-2025 school year)]. Calculate separately for reading and math. Calculate separately for grades 4, 8, and high school. The proficiency rate includes all children enrolled for a full academic year and those not enrolled for a full academic year.

Why did KSDE develop a new assessment?	<ul> <li>The retired tests were 10 years old. Items were dated, tired, and familiar.</li> <li>Tests were refocused based on current education needs.</li> <li>Technology has changed.</li> <li>Teachers and administrators asked for a shorter test.</li> <li>Performance Level Descriptors (PLDs) were not clearly defined.</li> </ul>
What did KSDE <u>not</u> change about assessments?	<ul> <li>Content standards (except ELA shift from balanced to structured literacy).</li> <li>Expectations on rigor.</li> <li>4 Performance Levels.</li> </ul>
How is Kansas's new assessment different from its previous assessment?	<ul> <li>2025 assessments were shorter.</li> <li>2025 assessments had all new items.</li> <li>Technology enhanced items replaced some multiple-choice items.</li> <li>ELA tests became passage-based.</li> <li>New Performance Level Descriptors (PLDs) provide greater clarity regarding what the assessment measures.</li> <li>Expectations for proficiency are more consistent from grade to grade.</li> </ul>
Why did KSDE need to establish new cut scores?	<ul> <li>Updated standard language, broader content coverage, and new items alter what students are expected to demonstrate.</li> <li>Using cut scores from a previous version can be misleading, attributing performance differences to student ability rather than to the test itself.</li> <li>To ensure accurate data interpretation.</li> </ul>

KSDE determined the above targets by reviewing data from the previous assessment for FFY2020-2023, setting baselines to FFY2024 to reflect new assessment data, and ensuring the final FFY2025 target was higher than the baseline year FFY2024 per OSEP's guidance.
