## Kindergarten Readiness Resources

The Kansas State Board of education sets our Kansans Can vision for education: Kansas leads the world in the success of each student. All children are ready to enter kindergarten when they meet the age requirement – five years old on or before August 31. The following resources can help families, teachers and school leaders become more kindergarten ready.

#### For Families:

The Kansas State Board of Education has identified Kindergarten Readiness as a key outcome for measuring progress toward our Kansans Can vision. This means that each student will enter kindergarten at age five socially, emotionally, and academically prepared for success. Regular kindergarten classrooms are expected to meet the needs of all incoming kindergarteners.

#### For Teachers:

Are you ready to meet the needs of **all** students who are eligible to attend kindergarten? Here are some resources to support kindergarten ready classrooms:

- The Kansas Full Day Kindergarten Guide shares guidance on age-appropriate
  expectations for kindergarten students, which includes including developmentally
  appropriate practice (play). The National Association for the Education of Young
  Children (NAEYC) has additional resources. Several Kansas schools have enjoyed using
  Purposeful Play for a book study.

- Engaging with families to better understand children's development prepares children,



families and schools for a successful start to the kindergarten year. Review Kindergarten Readiness Snapshot information. Note that Snapshot data should not be used to discourage age-eligible students from entering kindergarten.

### For Administrators/School Leaders:

The Kansans Can Star Recognition Program recognizes district success in the outcome measures Kansans told us they value, including Kindergarten Readiness. In order to be eligible for recognition in this area, a district must be in compliance with the following: *All families of children who are age-eligible for kindergarten (5 years old on or before Aug. 31) are encouraged to enroll their children in kindergarten. All children are welcomed – as they are – into heterogeneous kindergarten settings; they are not segregated into extra-year programs prior to or following regular kindergarten.* 

The following resources from well-respected early childhood organizations describe why institutionalizing redshirting policies or segregated kindergarten programs is concerning:

- Still Unacceptable Trends in Kindergarten Entry and Placement, developed by the National Association of State Leaders in Early Education and endorsed by the National Association for the Education of Young Children in 2001.
- The Power of Kindergarten: 10 Policies Leading to Positive Child Outcomes, adopted by the National Association of State Leaders in Early Education in 2013. Policy #10 is that all schools should not 'red-shirt' or recommend that parents hold out their age-eligible children, nor offer a sequenced two-year program with the intention that some children complete two years of kindergarten instruction.
